

I have lived in Kimba most of my life and have no problems with the site selection process and its transparency. I give my permission for my submission to be published on the internet but I wish to remain anonymous, as I work in a local business and don't want it to reflect badly upon it.

- I feel the financial compensation offered to the landowner is fair and adequate.

- I believe the Eyre Peninsula and wider state should not get any say/vote in the matter as that is shifting the boundary's and it would never be clear if the community has had increased support or not.
- My husband and I were fortunate enough to visit Lucas Heights, and all of our questions were answered thoroughly by experts and those who work with the waste. It would be nice to put the matter to rest, choose a site and build the facility now.
