#### PRL COMMUNITY PERCEPTIONS REPORTING

In 2020, a community survey and consultation opportunities were completed to determine the Christmas Island community's understanding and views on mining and an array of diversification opportunities proposed by PRL. #### **SUPPORT STATEMENTS**

Respondents were asked to note which statement associated with mining was most applicable to them. Those who supported mining (78%) had four statements to choose from. The proportions of people identifying with these statements are shown to the right.

Mountain bike tracks and support facilities across the Island; and,


Access to small areas of unallocated crown land for mining, under the CI Strategic Assessment


### **ECO-TOURISM RESORT AND SOLAR FARM**



#### **AWARENESS OF PRL'S CONTRIBUTIONS**

PRL currently contributes a number of ways to Christmas Island – both economically and socially. Respondents had various levels of awareness of these contributions.

> PRL is responsible for a significant component of the economy on Christmas Island (Fact: PRL is responsible for approximately 47% of the Christmas Island economy. This means that they contribute around \$45 million to the economy annually)

PRL pays significant government taxes and funds (Fact: PRL pays approximately \$14 million in taxes and revenues annually to the government)

PRL employees account for almost half of the workforce on Christmas Island - both directly and indirectly (Fact: PRL employees account for 49% of the direct and indirect jobs on Christmas Island)

PRL provides considerable funds for rehabilitating sites outside its own leases, which otherwise would need to be funded by the government (or not rehabilitated at all) (Fact: As well as PRL remediating its own sites, PRL provides approx. \$1.45 million per annum via the conservation levy)

PRL funds important environmental programs (Fact: PRL provided \$1.35 million to support the feral cat eradication program, and \$1 million to Boric Acid trails to support crazy ant eradication)

PRL has invested significant funds in the agricultural sector (Fact: PRL has provided over \$1 million to agricultural projects over the last 5 years. Their MINTOPE program ran for 5 years, and currently they are partnering with Hidden Garden in a project called Island Fresh).

PRL is an important sponsor to Christmas Island District High School (Fact: PRL has provided nearly \$400,000 to school tours, bursary and student awards over the past 12 years).


#### AWARENESS OF PRL'S Social Well-Being Initiatives / Programs
