I wish to make the following submission to the Procedure Committee inquiry into the parliamentary prayer in standing order 50:

I oppose utterly any change to the parliamentary prayer required in Standing Order 50.

I submit the following:

The requirement for the prayer is a very minimal expression of humility by the senate, recognising that simply being elected does not spontaneously provide any special wisdom or expertise and that our duty to the country necessitates an appeal to God for guidance in our endeavours.

Whether or not individual senators believe in Christianity has no bearing upon the value and importance of the daily prayer.
