- (2) repeated attempts to disguise the fact that the Attorney-General, as first law officer of the Commonwealth, has not ensured that Senator Vanstone and her staff are not investigated and held to account for leaking material on the Skase case without any regard to the possible damage they could cause to investigation of the Skase case at some stage prior to 5 January 1998 in order to resurrect Senator Vanstone's ministerial fortunes; and

(3) failure to discipline the Attorney-General for his breach of duty as first law officer in failing to take action to protect the integrity and reputation of the High Court (the Callinan matter)".
