Reasons of the House of Representatives for disagreeing to the amendment of the Senate

Senate Amendment No 1

The amendment proposes a retrospective start date for the measure which clarifies the meaning of 'eligible employee'. This is unnecessary. The Commissioner of Taxation has advised that controlling interest superannuation schemes are not effective under current law, and that he is undertaking appropriate compliance action. The Commissioner advises that his view of the law is supported by senior counsel. Retrospective legislation should only be used as a last resort, which is not the case here.

Accordingly, the House of Representatives does not accept this amendment.

On the motion of Mr Slipper, the reasons were adopted.
