# 11 TRADE PRACTICES LEGISLATION AMENDMENT BILL (NO. 1) 2005

The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the bill be now read a second time—*And on the amendment moved thereto by Mr Fitzgibbon, viz.*—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the bill a second reading, the House condemns the Government for:

- (1) constraining the economy's productive capacity by failing to build on Labor's competition reforms;
- (2) its failure to adopt all the recommendations of the Report of the Senate Inquiry into the effectiveness of the *Trade Practices Act 1974* in protecting small business;
- (3) its failure to promptly introduce appropriate criminal sanctions for cartel-type behaviour;
- (4) limiting the ability of small businesses to make their own choices in relation to appointing agents in collective bargaining negotiations; and
- (5) endangering small business collective bargaining reforms by including them in the same bill as the highly contentious changes to the merger approval regime and third line forcing laws"—

### Debate resumed.

Question—That the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the question—put.
