# MEMORANDUM OF ADVICE IN RELATION TO SECTION 44(i) OF THE COMMONWEALTH CONSTITUTION

### 1. INTRODUCTION AND RELEVANT BACKGROUND

- I have been asked to advise on whether Dai Trang Le was eligible to stand for election for the House of Representatives in the Parliament of Australia for the seat of Fowler in the Australian federal election held on 21 May 2022. In particular, I am asked to advise on whether Ms Le is disqualified from being chosen as a member of the House of Representatives by reason of section 44(i) of the Commonwealth of Australia Constitution Act (the Constitution).
- 1.2 I am instructed that the relevant chronology is as follows:
  - (a) On 1 April 1968 Ms Le was born in Vietnam.
  - (b) In about 1975, as a seven year old, Ms Le left Vietnam with her mother and two sisters.
  - (c) During the period 1975 to 1979 Ms Le was stateless and in refugee camps.
  - (d) In about December 1979 Ms Le was processed by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees and accepted for humanitarian resettlement and arrived at Wollongong Migrant Hostel in Fairy Meadow.
  - (e) In or about 1983 Ms Le was granted Australian citizenship.
  - (f) On 16 December 2021 Ms Le sent an email to the Consulate General of Vietnam indicating she did not believe she had the right to be a citizen of

Vietnam and in effect seeking to renounce her Vietnamese citizenship if she held it.

- (g) On about 21 December 2021 the Consulate General of Vietnam stated it was processing Ms Le's applications to:
  - (i) verify if she still possesses Vietnamese citizenship; and
  - (ii) renounce her Vietnamese citizenship if she has one.
- (h) On 14 February 2022 the Consulate General of Vietnam stated that the Consulate General had "not found sufficient evidence stating that [Ms Le] holds Vietnamese citizenship."
- (i) On 14 April 2022 Ms Le signed a nomination form to nominate as a member of the House of Representatives and a qualification checklist relating to eligibility under s 44 of the Constitution.
- 1.3 I am also instructed in relation to Vietnamese law that:
  - (a) prior to 2008, an individual's citizenship of Vietnam was annulled on their becoming a citizen of another country; and
  - (b) in 2008 the law of Vietnam was changed to permit dual citizenship but in order to reclaim lost citizenship an individual is required to apply and needs to have justified cause and permission from the President of Vietnam.
- 1.4 I am instructed that Ms Le has not made any such application to reclaim her Vietnamese citizenship after becoming an Australian citizen.

### 2. SUMMARY

As at 14 April 2022, being the date of Ms Le's nomination as a member of the House of Representatives Ms Le:

- (a) did not hold Vietnamese citizenship; and
- (b) if she did hold it, took reasonable steps to renounce it.
- 2.2 In my opinion, Ms Le is not disqualified from being chosen as a member of the House of Representatives by reason of section 44(i) of the Constitution.

### 3. DISQUALIFICATION: S 44 OF THE CONSTITUTION

## Provision and relevant legal principles

3.1 Section 44 of the Constitution relevantly provides:

"Any person who—

(i.) Is under any acknowledgment of allegiance, obedience, or adherence to a foreign power, or is a subject or a citizen or entitled to the rights or privileges of a subject or a citizen of a foreign power: or

shall be incapable of being chosen or of sitting as a senator or a member of the House of Representatives."

- 3.2 If a sitting member is disqualified then their seat becomes vacant by reason of s 45 of the Constitution.
- 3.3 The relevant principles emerge from *Re Canavan; Ludlam; Waters; Roberts [No 2]; Joyce; Nash; Xenophon* (2017) 263 CLR 284 (*Re Canavan*).
- 3.4 In summary:
  - (a) the temporal focus for the purposes of s 44(i) is upon the date of nomination as the date on and after which s 44(i) applies until the completion of the electoral process: *Re Canavan* at [3];
  - (b) s 44(i) has two limbs:

- (i) the first limb, which deals with acknowledgment, adherence and obedience to a foreign power, looks to the conduct of the person concerned;
- the second limb, concerning being a subject or citizen of a foreign power or being entitled to the rights of such a citizen or subject, does not require proof of actual allegiance as a state of mind, rather, the focus of the inquiry is the existence of a duty to a foreign power as an aspect of the status of citizenship: *Re Canavan* at [19], [25]-[26].
- (c) whether a person has the status of the subject or citizen of a foreign power depends upon the law of the foreign power, as that is the source of the status of citizenship and its rights and duties. However, that foreign law is not determinative of the operation of s 44(i) of the Commonwealth Constitution: *Re Canavan* at [37], [39] and [71];
- (d) proof of the person's knowledge of his or her foreign citizenship status is not necessary to bring about the disqualifying operation of s 44(i): *Re Canavan* at [60] and [71];
- (e) where the personal circumstances of a person give rise to disqualification the reasonableness of the steps taken by way of inquiry to ascertain whether those circumstances exist is immaterial to the operation of s 44(i): at [61] and [71]; and
- (f) the reasonable steps that must be taken are those required by the foreign law for renunciation of citizenship: at [68], [69] and [72].

## Application: Ms Le

- 3.5 The first issue to be determined is whether Ms Le is, or was as at 14 April 2022 (being the date of her nomination as a candidate), a Vietnamese citizen. This depends on the law of Vietnam.
- 3.6 Assuming that the law is as set out in paragraph 1.3 of this Advice, then Ms Le is not a Vietnamese citizen because:
  - (a) on becoming an Australian citizen in 1983 she lost any Vietnamese citizenship; and
  - (b) she has not applied to reclaim her Vietnamese citizenship.
- 3.7 Accordingly, she is not disqualified from being chosen as a member of the House of Representatives by reason of section 44(i) of the Constitution.
- 3.8 However, if this is wrong and the law of Vietnam is such that Ms Le remained, or became, a citizen of Vietnam the question is whether she has taken all steps that are reasonably required by Vietnamese law to renounce her citizenship prior to 14 April 2022.
- 3.9 In my opinion, in circumstances where:
  - (a) Ms Le applied, in 2021, to the Consulate General of Vietnam to determine whether she held Vietnamese citizenship and if so to renounce it; and
  - (b) the Consulate General of Vietnam informed her that it had "not found sufficient evidence stating that [Ms Le] holds Vietnamese citizenship" and did not otherwise inform her of additional steps required to renounce any citizenship,

Ms Le had taken reasonable steps, prior to 14 April 2022, to renounce her Vietnamese citizenship (assuming she held such citizenship).

"[67] No member of the majority in Sykes v Cleary said that a candidate who does not know that he or she is a citizen of a foreign country can be said to take reasonable steps to renounce that citizenship by doing nothing at all in that regard. It is true that Dawson J said that what is reasonable will "depend upon such matters as the requirements of the foreign law for the renunciation of the foreign nationality, the person's knowledge of his foreign nationality and the circumstances in which the foreign nationality was accorded to that person." His Honour may be taken, consistently with the views expressed by the plurality and by Brennan J, with whom he agreed, to have had in mind cases where not only the tenacity but also the inaccessibility of the foreign law was apt practically to prevent an Australian citizen from exercising the choice to participate in the system of representative government established by the Constitution. It may be that not all foreign states afford their citizens the levels of assistance in relation to the ascertainment and renunciation of their citizenship that is available from states such as most members of the Commonwealth of Nations. Some foreign states may be unwilling or unable to provide necessary information in relation to the ascertainment and means of renunciation of their citizenship.

[68] The plurality in Sykes v Cleary said that the steps reasonably available to a candidate to free himself or herself from the ties of foreign citizenship depend on "the situation of the individual, the requirements of the foreign law and the extent of the connexion between the individual and the foreign State". The circumstance that Mr Kardamitsis had participated in a naturalisation ceremony in which he had expressly renounced his foreign allegiance was not sufficient to justify the conclusion that he had taken reasonable steps to divest himself of his foreign citizenship because under the foreign law he could have applied for the favourable exercise of a discretion by the appropriate Minister of the Greek government to release him from his citizenship. The application for the favourable exercise of the discretion was a step reasonably open to him." (footnotes omitted)

3.11 Ms Le, in enquiring of the Vietnamese Consulate General whether she held Vietnamese citizenship and if so to renounce it, and such enquiry being accepted by the Vietnamese Consulate General as applications of the same, has taken the required reasonable steps.
