I was wanting to understand the determinant of the decision to change how we were reporting on COVID deaths? Have you got the COVID deaths there yet?  Prof. Kelly: Yes.  Prof. Murphy: While Professor Kelly is getting that, the department was strongly pushing that change. We did originally use a fairly unverified death statistic which was calculated from the various reports of states and territories when they were reporting every day. They used to report their deaths every day and they were not verified, and often when the ABS analysis happened some weeks later</p>	Pages 8-9	22/02/2023

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				<p>we had to revise them down. In the early phase of the epidemic, when there was huge public interest in the daily death numbers and they were driving vaccine uptake and so on, it was quite important to get something that was seen by the community to be real-time, but in being real time it compromised accuracy. Many of those deaths were then revised down, found not to be due to COVID. As Professor Kelly said, the gold standard has always been the ABS. We, the department, put to government late last year that we thought it was time to move to the gold standard method that would provide accurate time-to-time comparison. It was very much our desire to move away from what was an inherently inaccurate system.</p> <p>Prof. Kelly: However, we still are reporting on the National Notifiable Diseases surveillance system data every week rather than daily. It does have every day's data in there, but it is less liable to those fluctuations, as the secretary has said. The number is 18,190, as at 8 February.</p> <p>Senator RUSTON: Have you got them broken down into years, 2020, '21, '22 and obviously to date, this year?</p> <p>Prof. Kelly: The data for 2022 is 14,855.</p> <p>Senator RUSTON: So it's 14,855 for 2022?</p> <p>Prof. Kelly: For 2022. There have been 892 so far this year.</p> <p>Senator RUSTON: For '23. What about '20 and '21?</p> <p>Prof. Kelly: I'll just take that on notice for the moment, if I may, and we'll look back on that and get it back to you later.</p>

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				<p>seemed to be an unexplained increase in the number of deaths in some areas. We don't know whether they were COVID related deaths or not. We're assuming they are, but we don't know from what period they were likely to be applied to. Is there somewhere that you can go and get fully reconciled data on a week-by-week basis so that you can make some sort of sense out of what these numbers are?</p> <p>Prof. Kelly: Just to make sure I've got your question exactly in my mind, you're looking to see what was reported on a particular day?</p> <p>Senator RUSTON: No, not a day. A week is fine.</p> <p>Prof. Kelly: I'd have to take that on notice, but what I can say is the data which is publicly available on the Health website is the most accurate data on that day, which includes the reconciled data going back. The other issue—and recognising that 2023 is still relatively a new year—is that there is a delay usually of sometimes weeks before the accurate death data comes in. Even through this process, as I mentioned, sometimes that can be even longer if we're waiting for a coroner's report. Just on that, the other important reason we're very interested in using the ABS data is that they have a much more accurate way of looking deaths with COVID, deaths from COVID and the underlying illnesses that might have contributed. It also allows us to look specifically at aged care residents, at people with a disability, First Nations people and so on, and those things are really important for policy.</p>		
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SQ23-000039	Department of Health and Aged Care	Anne Ruston	Data relating to deaths in Aged Care	<p>Senator RUSTON: To be honest, my interest sits around the fact that we had 686 deaths in 2020 when we were in a state of great uncertainty and terror. We went into 2021 and with the great work you guys did-and I acknowledge the extraordinary work in aged care facilities by the Department of Health and Aged Care-we managed to get that number down to 226, which was a phenomenal effort. In 2022 we then saw 3,855, with a significant escalation towards the end of last year. I think it was less than a thousand in the first half of the year and 2,000 in the second part of the year, and we're still seeing significant deaths in aged care now. I'm trying to understand what happened that resulted in the phenomenal success that you had in aged care to have deteriorated so significantly by the end of 2022, where we saw nearly 3,000 deaths in the second half of 2022 in aged care. Was there something we should've done that we didn't do? Was there some circumstance that we can put this down to? What were the lessons learnt from that to ensure that we don't see the horrific figures that we saw in the last six months of last year?</p> <p>Prof. Kelly: I'll just talk about deaths in aged care, and there's others that might want to chip in on that from the aged care area themselves. Death from any cause, of course, is a sad but unfortunately inevitable event. It's a very common daily event in aged care. In fact, since the start of the pandemic, 175,513 residents of aged care have died of all causes. But very specifically to your comment about the second half of last year, that figure I gave you was for the full year. The highest death rate was actually in January of last year, not the second half of the year. But the reality is people die in aged care and some of those have died from COVID.</p>	Page 10	16/02/2023
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				<p>Senator RUSTON: So, you're saying more people died in the first half of last year, not the second half of last year?</p> <p>Prof. Kelly: There were 3,855 deaths in aged care related to COVID in 2022. There were, as you know, several waves of Omicron related COVID during the year. The highest rate and the biggest effect on aged care was actually the first one, which was in December of '21 and peaked in January of '22 and then into February. But there were other waves. There was another wave in winter which also affected aged care and there was another wave towards the end of the year as well. I don't have the breakdown in front of me. I'll take that on notice about when those deaths occurred. But there were deaths in aged care throughout 2022.</p>

Your colleague just informed us that some work is being done. My question was: when did that work commence?</p> <p>Mr Cotterell: The department started undertaking exploratory work on this issue as soon as the royal commission made its recommendations. I don't think we've provided advice to this government about it.</p> <p>Senator STEELE-JOHN: When did you begin that exploratory work? I'm trying to find out when you started, firstly.</p> <p>Ms Rishniw: Can I take that on notice in terms of actual dates? What is needed here is a seniors dental benefits scheme. Your minister has not made a direction to the department to investigate the setting up of the scheme so long after the recommendation was made. Is it the intention of the government to make a commitment to such a scheme in the coming budget?</p> <p>Senator McCarthy: Can I just correct you there. We've had the passage of two new acts through parliament in 2022, combined with measures from the October '22-23 budget, which will address in full or in part a total of 37 recommendations. As at 27 January this year, as we've heard, 19 recommendations are completed; 107 recommendations are in progress; and for the remaining 22 recommendations the department is working with government on its reform priorities and to determine whether further action is required. So, we are working on it.</p> <p>I cannot stress enough that this body of work is being done.</p> <p>Senator STEELE-JOHN:Specifically, though, on the seniors dental benefits scheme, are you saying that there is work being done and the government is expecting a recommendation to be made to it in relation to the setting up of that scheme?</p> <p>Senator McCarthy: Certainly the minister and the department are working on it. Can I check that it's correct that no public data has been released since that which was collected in 2018, about three years ago?</p> <p>Mr Cotterell: There's no longitudinal dataset on dental health. From time to time, the department and governments answer research studies. That would have been one of them, that latest available data. We're considering when the next one will be undertaken.</p> <p>Senator STEELE-JOHN: So you're considering it now?</p> <p>Mr Cotterell: Yes.</p> <p>Senator STEELE-JOHN: When did that consideration process commence?</p> <p>Mr Cotterell: I will need to take that on notice. It's very hard to see how you will track against those KPIs if you're using a dataset that's three years old.</p> <p>Mr Cotterell: As I say, we're considering undertaking the next study to update that data.</p> <p>Senator STEELE-JOHN: Is there an intention to take that recommendation to the National Cabinet space to enlist the states in the gathering of that data?</p> <p>Mr Cotterell: Our minister is discussing long-term dental health reforms with the states in the context of the Health Ministers' Meeting. That's a live discussion. There's a working group on long-term dental reform that is looking at these issues, the funding of the adult public dental schemes, funding that's currently provided through outpatient departments and a range of other mechanisms. We're looking at how we can make that more sustainable in the long run.</p> <p>Senator STEELE-JOHN: In relation to the plan, is there an intention to report against the KPIs in the plan?</p> <p>Mr Cotterell: I think we have a commitment to do that, yes.</p> <p>Senator STEELE-JOHN: Could you just come back to us with a clear yes or no with that? I note that the report is available online. Beyond the plan, there is a report available online titled Oral health and dental care in Australia, which includes some key reporting, including how many people have been assessed, how many people have accessed dental services, and hospitalisations that may have been prevented had they received earlier treatment. The report was last updated online in about March of 2022, from what I've been able to see. It includes data from 2019 to 2021. If there's data for this report, why is there no public data to complete an updated report</p>		
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				<p>against the National Oral Health Plan? It seems that we have a serious problem when you've got one report over here with a more recent dataset than the National Oral Health Plan.</p> <p>Mr Cotterell: I'm not familiar with the precise dataset you're referring to. We'll need to have a look at that. As I've said, we have a commitment to update the data. We're working on doing that and have a commitment to report at the end of the oral health plan.</p> <p>Ms Rishniw: As I'm sure you would be aware, datasets vary depending on the particular slice that we take. It may be that it's reliant on hospital data and AIHW data rather than a much more comprehensive set. If we take that detail, we'll be able to provide a comprehensive answer.</p>

What matters are taken into account that would determine whether the recommendation was accepted or not?</p> <p>Ms Shakespeare: I suppose things like the ability of the service to be provided in Australia through providers. MSAC will look at part of that, but we also need to confirm that with the clinical providers. The example I gave earlier about ensuring that we have adequate protection of broad community based genetic data for testing purposes; it really can vary depending on what the item is.</p> <p>Senator RUSTON: Is the assumption then that, in the process of assessing that, if you get the green light on everything and there is nothing preventing that particular recommendation from being practically applied, then it would automatically be approved? 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				<p>Ms Shakespeare: There are also legislative processes. MBS items are given effect through legislative instruments. We go through a process working with providers-</p> <p>Senator RUSTON: They're not disallowable, though, are they?</p> <p>Ms Shakespeare:Yes. The general medical services table and the pathology services table-they're all legislative instruments.</p> <p>Senator RUSTON: Every time you list a new MBS item it's a disallowable legislative instrument?</p> <p>Ms Shakespeare: Yes. In terms of developing the legislative instrument, we need to look at conditions, and we do check those with providers to make sure they're as clear as possible; that we don't end up with any unintended impacts on delivery of services or patients in the way that the legislative instruments are drafted.</p> <p>Senator RUSTON: On average, how long does it take from an MSAC recommendation to those instruments being tabled?</p> <p>Ms Shakespeare: I'd need to check that.
