Opening comments for Senate Estimates (24/10/2019)

Senators, if I may take a moment, World Teachers' Day is being celebrated across Australia tomorrow. It would be remiss of me if I did not recognise the amazing work happening in schools and early childhood centres across the country. AITSL exists to serve and lead the education profession, something it has done with pride and commitment for ten years. And over these ten years, by building strong connections with the profession- including the over 160,000 educators who have signed up to our monthly e-news, we have a credible and respected reputation as a voice for the profession.

AITSL Board Chair, Laureate Professor John Hattie says that we don't need to go to Singapore or Finland to see expert teaching practice happening. And of course he is absolutely right! The theme for AITSL this year is Teaching A Bright Future - with a special focus on beginning teachers. The theme is about making sure we invest in the next generation of teachers and support them as they move into and through the teaching profession. Equally it is about acknowledging the key role of experienced teachers, including some of our most expert teachers, and how they generously give their time and expertise to coach tomorrow's teachers.

Ultimately, World Teachers' Day is about reminding the community of the value of teachers and celebrating the profession. When you're out in schools and early childhood centres, working with these teachers, you see first-hand their expertise, impact and commitment.

For these reasons I am confident of a bright future for teaching.
