Outcome 2 – Higher Education, Research and International

- **3: The cost of funding guarantees made as part of the Higher Education Relief Package.** (Letter 1) As part of the Higher Education Relief Package Commonwealth Grant Scheme (CGS) and HELP funding streams for higher education providers were guaranteed for 2020, irrespective of enrolments. Together, these two funding streams were worth over \$14 billion, ensuring the higher education sector received over \$18 billion in 2020.

The CGS has been guaranteed through the Higher Education Relief Program, established under the Other Grants Guidelines. Through this program, upon reconciliation of CGS payments for 2020 against actual enrolments, providers will receive funding to ensure they receive their full Maximum Basic Grant Amount (MBGA), irrespective of enrolments.

The Government committed to maintaining HELP advances in 2020, with any repayments required for over-payment due to lower than anticipated enrolments subject to an eight year repayment period.

While the final cost of this guarantee will be determined once enrolment data for 2020 is verified, it is anticipated that this will be low as many universities found that their enrolments were maintained.

4: Updated participant numbers on the Government's JobMaker program. (Letter 3)
