The administrative error was that the responsible officer didn't have the grants posted within 21 days, as they were required to do. Senator HENDERSON: In terms of the administrative error, was there any connection with any delay out of the minister's office? These decisions had been made, so it wasn't like the minister was stalling. Mr Cook: No, it's nothing to do with the minister's office. This is purely a departmental issues in terms of administration of the publication of those grants.

Senator HENDERSON: As part of the counselling, are staff being retrained as well?

Mr Cook: Yes. Mr Markovic can probably give some more detail. Mr Markovic: The secretary has already indicated that the breaches are of high importance to the department. We have been doing significant work around training with our staff and making sure that people understand the processes and procedures. To give you some evidence of that, for the period 1 July to 30 September, the department as a whole has recorded 24 breaches—a significant reduction from last year. Clearly, 24 is still too many. We want that to be zero. We are working closely with our staff on training, on making sure that people are appropriately counselled and on eliminating PGPA breaches where we can. I want to give you some confidence that we are treating this seriously and trying to make progress on improving this.

Senator HENDERSON: On notice, could you provide a copy of those documents in relation to the training and counselling? Obviously, I understand you may want to redact names.

Ms Twyman: I will refer that to my colleague Rachel O'Connor, who has the details on that particular one, but I think that relates to the inclusion development fund manager for the inclusion support program. They have been the inclusion development fund manager for that period of time. Essentially the way the inclusion support program works is that it's got various different elements, but the particular element that we're talking about here is where additional educators or support are given for services to include children with additional needs. It's a plethora of services nationally, and it would be quite a large quantum. KU would

hold that detail, obviously, for accountability purposes, but it wouldn't necessarily be reported specifically on GrantConnect, because they're not grants per se under the terms of the GrantConnect obligations to report.

Senator HODGINS-MAY: It seems like a significant amount of money to not have some sort of public transparency around those itemised amounts. If you could please provide on notice the particulars of what that money was spent on, that would be most appreciated. I've finished on that particular topic.

Senator HODGINS-MAY: Ms Twyman, while you're still up here, I might ask one more question following on from my earlier questions around the contract between the Department of Education and KU Children's Services. We talked about the fact that the variation will end on 30 June and that the department is still considering what will happen after that date. Are you able to provide some information around what steps the department is taking to ensure that the provider of this service is delivering the best value for money? Ms Twyman: I'm hoping this will answer your question. We have a range of functions within the department around contract management and around ensuring the providers are providing value for money but also quality of service. That includes monitoring through the contracts—so monitoring the milestones and making sure they are being met and working with them to ensure that's occurring. Within the Inclusion Support Program, we in the department are the delegate for financial decisions. We ensure that that is done according to those delegations and in tandem with the work they are providing us so that we're satisfied to make those decisions. In terms of other performance areas, we have regular contract management meetings with KU. We call to attention where there are areas of concern, and together we work through what the solutions to those might be. Senator HODGINS-MAY: Is there anything that could be provided to us, for us to understand those discussions that have been had and where sometimes performance is being questioned, and delivery that review of that contract. Is there any information you're able to provide to us around those benchmarks and service delivery? Ms Twyman: We can take that on notice. A lot of that conversation would be fairly confidential to the contract, but we could have a look

at what details can be shared around the contracts m	ore broadly.

Senator O'SULLIVAN: Not the Office— Ms Sandlant: No, not the Office for Youth—of youth participants from the advisory groups. Senator O'SULLIVAN: How many nights was their accommodation charged? Ms Sandlant: I'd have to take that on notice and come back to you, because some people stayed long— Senator O'SULLIVAN: I want to be clear: I'm not asking for any details of individuals or any information that would identify them. Ms Sandlant: Some people just stayed longer because of where they lived and flights. I'd have to take exactly what that was on notice. Ms Twyman: Just to add to Ms Sandlant's comments: some people had to stay longer because of those flights, and that meant our people had to stay longer as well because they had to support those people. That might shed light on why some of that was a bit longer as well. It depended on the age of that person. Senator O'SULLIVAN: Was child care then arranged for those minors, for those children? Or were they in the groups? Ms Sandlant: They had carers that came along with them as well to look after them during— Senator O'SULLIVAN: And were costs covered for those carers? Ms Sandlant: Yes. They are the ones that select and prioritise the schools for funding, having regard to the criteria that we've got set out in the federal financial relations agreement. There's quite specific criteria that sits around the expectations, about how the program runs, but it's those panels that are the final determiners in each of the jurisdictions.

Senator O'SULLIVAN: Is it a fixed amount per school, a capped amount?

Ms Banerjee: Yes, it is. I don't have that number with me, at the moment.

Senator O'SULLIVAN: My understanding is there's a difference between a metro and a regional school, in terms of the loading. Ms Banerjee: There is a difference.

Ms Brighton: The distribution is up to 20,280 or up to 24,336 for remote or very remote schools.

Senator O'SULLIVAN: I believe this amount was increased back in 2019. Is that correct?

Ms Brighton: I will have to check the previous agreement to confirm what the arrangements were previously, so I'll take that on notice. Senator O'SULLIVAN: I just want to understand if it's increased since that time. If you can come back to me on that, I'd like to see the historical amounts as well.

Ms Brighton: Can I confirm, when you say 'increase' are you asking whether the per school distribution amount has increased? Senator O'SULLIVAN: Yes, correct.

Ms Brighton: We will come back to you on notice on that. The value of this program over that 2022-23 period to the forwards was in the order of 307 million or so. We'll come back on notice.

Senator O'SULLIVAN: I want to know the amount per school, not just the aggregate, because there might be more schools that have increased their overall number. My understanding is that each state and territory establishes a panel of providers; then the schools enter their own agreements with a provider of their choosing from that

		panel. Is that correct?  Ms Banerjee: That is correct, to my understanding.  Senator O'SULLIVAN: Are you aware of which providers are used at each state and territory level or even at school level? That matter was reviewed not only with the staff member involved but more widely with staff to ensure that communication and correspondence with providers on this issue are guite clearly based on the fact that it relates to proposed legislation, and not legislation that has been passed. However, all of those providers who received the letter would, in any case, have triggered inquiries about their financial or other aspects of their compliance with the standards because they had flagged as high-risk providers. We monitor various metrics, activities and information from multiple agencies, and we not infrequently ask providers to give us that sort of information. The request remained, but we clearly wrote to and contacted all of those providers and explained that the specific reference to the proposed numbers of international students, should the ESOS legislation be passed, was not correct. Senator HENDERSON: Thank you very much for that.

It is true that for some but not all universities, if we were doing a 2024 estimate now, it would be a little bit lower; for a couple of universities, including Sydney, it would be quite a lot lower. Other universities are a little bit up on the estimate that we did in 2024. That's the nature of a forecast. If you do a forecast of a full year of activity in June, you are by definition going to be a little bit inaccurate; if you do it in August, you'll be a bit more accurate; if you do it in October, you'll be a bit more accurate again.
