Finance has been involved in that process, as appropriate.  Senator McALLISTER: So, it wasn't necessary for there to be a cabinet decision, because it is a decision of the Prime Minister?  Senator Cormann: Machinery-of-government arrangements, under governments of both political persuasions, are the purview of the Prime Minister.
