## SUMMARY AS AT 28 September 2018

## Activity

In the $45^{\text {th }}$ Parliament, at 28 September 2018, there have been:

- 290 references ( 264 new references and 26 re-adopted from the 44 th Parliament);
- 366 reports tabled;
- 587 hearings.

## Additional indicators of activity:

- The department is currently supporting five select committees. Nine select committees have completed their inquiries. During the $44^{\text {th }}$ Parliament, the department supported 12 select committees.
- At present, the department also supports six joint committees and one joint select committee.


## Staffing

Average staffing for 2017-18: At 30 June 2018 there were 70.2 Full Time Equivalent staff in the Committee Office, compared with an average FTE of 68.3 in 2016-17 (66.8 for 2015-16).

## Administration

Cost of running Senate committees: The current annual budget for the Committee Office is approximately $\$ 8.8$ million. This includes employee expenses of $\$ 8.3$ million and administrative expenses (including secretariat travel, accommodation and venues for hearings) of $\$ 0.5$ million.

In 2017-18, total operational costs for the Committee Office were $\$ 11.1$ million (including corporate overheads).

As an indicator of the level of committee activity, the following chart averages the number of inquiries referred over the duration of each parliament. For instance, there were fewer references in the 44th Parliament than the 43rd, however, the 44th Parliament was 19 weeks (4 and a half months) shorter in duration so the level of activity over time was higher.
Similarly, the figures for the 45th Parliament cover approximately 26 months to September 2018 but, as can be seen, the rate at which matters have been referred is higher than in the previous two parliaments.
