Mr Pezzullo: If there are particular programs, they might have some access; there's also the pooling of resources through the Australian Criminal Intelligence Commission, upon which the WA Police Force sits as a board member. There's a special account; they pool funds to support them in their intelligence and data activity but I'd have to take the specifics of that on notice. As far as I'm concerned, or aware at least—and I'll take this on notice—I don't think there's a generalised grants program for state police. State police forces are funded by the states, including through the GST arrangements with the Commonwealth and through other mechanisms, no doubt. But I'll take notice whether there are any tailored or specific grants or special account arrangements, other than the one that I've mentioned, which is the ACIC special account. Senator GEORGIOU: For examples of some grants that were given: the federal government gave \$4 million to Victoria Police for the Trident waterfront task force and another \$3.2 million to the New South Wales Police Force for the Polaris joint waterfront task force. Mr Pezzullo: I think you'll find that those aren't grant programs, as such. I'm familiar with both of those operations; they would be joint Commonwealth-state policing activities. So the federal contribution, almost certainly—but I'll correct the record if need to, in terms of taking it on notice—would be to fund the activities of the joint team, including in respect of the seconded Federal Police, Border Force and other officers. We don't have a grants program, as such, for those operations. State forces fund their contribution and the federal authorities fund theirs. Again, if I need to correct that, I will.
