Question:

I want you to have a look at the amount of money over the last 10 years that you have put into the Tasmanian Aboriginal Centre (TAC) compared to every other group that is down there that is Indigenous.

Answer:

The Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet has had responsibility as lead Commonwealth agency for the Indigenous Affairs portfolio since 2013/2014. From July 2014 to November 2016, the Department has invested around \$33 million in grants and services in organisations in Tasmania through the Indigenous Advancement Strategy (IAS)¹. Of this total, the Tasmanian Aboriginal Centre (TAC) received grants totalling \$8 million through the IAS, noting that TAC has also received funding through other Commonwealth departments.

Determining the amount of funding the Commonwealth has provided to an organisation over ten years would require an unreasonable redirection of departmental resources.

¹ Note that funding cannot be disaggregated for Activities that are delivered across multiple jurisdictions and have been represented as the full value of the grant.

Answer:

The Commonwealth Government uses the Australian Bureau of Statistics 2011 national Census population data of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders in Tasmania. This was 24,165 people. There has been population growth since this figure was recorded. Projected population for June 2016 was 27,052. Updated population estimates will be available from the 2016 ABS Census.

The number of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders recognised by the Tasmanian Government is a matter for the Tasmanian Government.
