## Inquiry into the administration and reporting of NAPLAN testing

I respond to the invitation to provide a submission to the Inquiry, and offer the following commentary, on terms of reference

- (c) the impact of the NAPLAN assessment and reporting regime &
- (d) international approaches to the publication of comparative reporting of the results, i.e. 'league tables';

However capacities in these areas are increasingly constrained in a command-and-control approach that is leading to an unprecedented level of centralisation, standardisation and bureaucratisation.
