INTRODUCTION

Market Facts was been commissioned by 'Kids First' who are a non-profit, non-political organisation, based in Brisbane, run by volunteers, to undertake market research to determine community opinion on government funding for children's care.

Research Methodology

Market Facts (Qld), in conjunction with Kids First jointly developed the survey instrument used for the research. A copy of the questionnaire used for this research is contained in the Appendix of this report.

For the survey, the sample group comprised respondents from Federal Electorate of Griffith in Queensland.

Random telephone numbers were drawn from the following suburbs:

- Bulimba
- Norman Park
- Carina
- Holland Park
- Coorparoo
- Woolloongabba
- Kangaroo Point
- South Brisbane
- West End
- Dutton Park
- Greenslopes

Due to time constraints, a total sample of n=259 respondents were interviewed. The quota aimed for was n=500, however, due to the aforementioned reason, results were then weighted for a sample of n=500. The resulting weighted tables were weighted on the gender factor, being equal males and females, therefore the resulting presented percentages varied very little from the unweighted base of n=259.

This sample size is sufficient to provide a statistically reliable result, as it is based on the 90% confidence level, so that the results presented in this report are within a maximum Probable Error of between ± 3.82 and $\pm 4.95\%$.

Survey fieldwork was undertaken from 19 – 22 February 2010.

Data Processing and Analysis

As a matter of course the data, after input, was cleaned and logic-checked to ensure errorfree detailed tables. All percentages in the tabular output have been rounded to one decimal point. Significance tests have been applied to identify those differences in response among the various subgroups, which were highly unlikely to have occurred due to chance.

All responses were coded and computer-analysed using the following breaks of:

- Age
- Gender
- Current work status
- Occupation on main income earner

These breaks were established to enable the identification of significant differences in response patterns among the various community sectors represented by the sub-samples. For all analysis of these standard demographic breaks, we have applied significance tests to the differences between the sub-samples and the total sample. These appear in the tables as:

- +++ significantly greater than the sample result at the 99% level of confidence
- ++ significantly greater than the sample result at the 95% level of confidence
- + significantly greater than the sample result at the 90% level of confidence
- --- significantly lower than the sample result at the 99% level of confidence
- -- significantly lower than the sample result at the 95% level of confidence
- significantly lower than the sample result at the 90% level of confidence

Tables included in this Report only show results for the Total Sample. However, a comprehensive printout of all analyses has been closely examined in compiling the commentary in the 'detailed findings' section of this report.



Should Government funding be the same per child...







- The sample was 1,042 respondents aged 18 years and older distributed throughout Australia, as follows:

- Interviews were conducted using CATI (computer assisted telephone interviewing) with telephone numbers randomly selected from electronic White Pages. All interviewers were personally trained and briefed on the requirements of the study.
- Age, gender and region quotas were applied to the sample.
- Following the completion of interviewing, the data was weighted by age, gender and region to reflect the latest Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) population estimates.











- The majority of Australians believe that the government's paid parental leave plan should give equal funding to both mums in paid work and stay-home mums. Overall, 64% believe in equal funding, compared to just 30% that do not.
- Support for equal funding may be observed across all demographic groups but is especially popular among women (66%).
- Young people are also very supportive of equal funding with 79% of those aged 18-34 years in favour. As many as 71% of parents also favour equal funding.
- Most Australians do not believe that children being cared for at home should be treated any differently to children in daycare centres when it comes to government funding. Overall, 59% believe that where the child is being cared for should not affect the amount the parents receive from the government.
- As many as 67% of parents believe that children being cared for at home by a parent should receive equal government funding to those children in daycare centres.
