Firstly, the Councils are not capable of fixing the damaged roads themselves, they do not have the man power or the money and the ratepayers cannot afford more hikes in the rates at the present.

I live in **Example**, apart from some localised flooding, we do not flood but our roads suffer extreme damage when it rains and even when it doesn't rain, since the start of the build of the new Windsor bridge, extra truck traffic comes through our area, plus Spinks Road is the main road in and out of the town, in fact there is no other road.
