Aims & Objectives

1. Ultimate goal to make FASD history in Newcastle

- 2. Focus on those areas evidence suggests highest priority
- 3. Focus on most vulnerable (restorative process)

4. Identify where Newcastle can make a difference

5. Effectively address issue of **cognitive impairment** in local JJS

Prerequisites

- Identification of and collaboration from all local stakeholders
- Inter agency/NGO buy-in and cooperation
- Leg work (LDAT small funds)
- Evidence based, not reinvent the wheel, avoid stigmatisation
- Harness Newcastle's strong sense of achievement and other attributes including personnel and resources (research, medical, community/welfare, justice, university etc)

Proposed action plan

FASD prevention starts with awareness

- Workforce development of all local stakeholders is critical (WA model of care)
- Critical mass pool of FASD awareness spill-over benefits to broader community
- Achieve agreed common levels of awareness and potential cost savings and related efficiencies from existing programs

FASD awareness modules

- 1. What is FASD magnitude of harms
- 2. Identifying cognitive impairment manifestations of FASD given it's a 'spectrum' of disorders
- 3. Implications of cognitive impairment including victim, offender & witness
- 4. How should we respond in JJS to kids (carers?) suspected with an cognitive impairment
- 5. Creating a (model) diagnostic referral pathway

Identifying existing barriers to timely diagnosis

- Lack of workforce awareness in some sectors
- Significant local health resource gaps (lobby capacity of LDAT)
- Exchange of vital inter agency information
- Existing lack of recording of alcohol use patterns and suspected impairments
- Historically no local unifying force silo free zone

Acknowledge importance of early warning

- GPs, Pre school, infants, primary early secondary schooling (average age first JJS contact 12.5 yrs)
- Police usually have numerous contacts before this time
- Earlier detection of cognitive impairment greater opportunity to modify some behaviours
- Essential GP involvement in project
- Dr Webber's Health pathway

Summary of LDAT 'Many hands' project

- A 'model' project to achieve FASD awareness workforce development across all local stakeholders
- Establish NSW Pilot for cognitive impairment diagnostic diversionary pathway similar to NSW adult justice trial
- Address critical information flows between stakeholders
- Incorporate early warning stakeholder sentinels within project
- Driven by this community reference panel
