

EDUCATION - WHAT ARE YOU ENTITLED TO IN 2014?

The cost of education is high no matter what form of education you are hoping to offer a child in your care. For many carers, DHS or your community services agency may well be able to assist with covering the costs associated with putting children through school. For other carers, particularly those in non-statutory kinship arrangements, this assistance is not always forthcoming. The following subsidies and fee assistance packages are available to all statutory and non-statutory carers:

Parent Payments in Victorian Government Schools

There are three categories of education items or services for which schools can request payment from parents or guardians:

- 1. Essential education items for which the parent/guardian must pay to provide, or for which the parent/guardian must pay the school to provide (e.g. text books, stationary, school uniforms where required)
- 2. Optional educational items which are offered on a user-pays basis allowing the parent /guardian to choose whether their child has access to such items; (eg: school magazines or extracurricular activities)
- 3. Voluntary financial contributions which parents and guardians may be invited to donate to the school;

School Councils are required to develop their own policy around these payments, with the stipulation being that the developed policy be in line with the Department's policy and it be made available to all parents and guardian upon request.

State Schools' Relief Committee

The State Schools' Relief Committee Incorporated is an autonomous body that assists needy students attending government schools in Victoria with school clothing and footwear.

All requests for assistance must be lodged with the School Principal, and the Principal must then lodge an application for assistance on behalf of the parent or guardian with the State Schools' Relief Committee.

Note: Most schools will offer a second hand uniform shop which provides parents/guardian with a cheaper uniform option for their child.

Most schools employ the services of a Welfare Officer and/or a School Chaplain. If you encounter difficulties when trying to access any of these services, please contact FCAV and we will do what we can to liaise and facilitate this process.

If you are having difficulty in meeting the financial obligations of schooling a child in your care, please ask for help. Refer to your DHS case worker, agency worker, support group or the Foster Care Association of Victoria if your need help or advice beyond what has been provided here.
