**Free Trade Agreement between the Government of Australia and the
Government of the People's Republic of China**

Australian Pork Limited (APL) welcomes the opportunity to provide a submission to the Joint Standing Committee on Treaties on the inquiry into the Free Trade Agreement between the Government of Australia and the Government of the People's Republic of China (ChAFTA).

APL is the national representative body for Australian pig producers. It is a producer-owned not-for-profit company combining marketing, export development, research and innovation and policy development to assist in securing a profitable and sustainable future for the Australian pork industry.

As an industry that strongly supports the principles of free trade and competes very successfully on domestic and international markets without the benefit of producer subsidies or tariff barriers, APL is a strong supporter of the ChAFTA.

APL welcomes the outcome for Australia's pork producers through market access to China for all fresh, chilled and frozen pork lines, pork products, offal and live pigs. ChAFTA secures Australia's potential position in a market where some key competitors already have preferential access, particularly Chile and New Zealand and provides Australia with an advantage over its other major agricultural competitors, including the US, Canada and the European Union (EU).

While ChAFTA reduces tariffs applying to Australian pork products, this outcome was not linked to a pork import protocol or export processor accreditation, with both being required before Australia can take advantage of the opportunities provided under the ChAFTA.

Establishing an export business now requires the development of a China import protocol and, concurrently, the accreditation of export establishments, which will take substantial time and sustained engagement. It will also require a significant demonstration of capability to satisfy Chinese authorities of the Australian pork industry's readiness to export. With a number of other Australian commodities and countries seeking similar approvals, this can be challenging both in terms of time and resources for the Chinese and Australian governments.

APL is working with the Australian Government in order to secure maximum commercial value from the ChAFTA. APL encourages the Committee to give the treaty its full support to ensure an early entry into force and implementation of the agreement.
