National Health and Hospitals Network Bill 2010 – reintroduced into the House of Representatives on 29 September 2010

The Public Health Association of Australia (PHAA) welcomes the opportunity to provide a submission to the Community Affairs Legislation Committee on the National Health and Hospitals Network Bill 2010. PHAA notes that the Bill:

“Establishes the Australian Commission for Safety and Quality in Health Care as an independent statutory body and provides for: the functions and powers of the commission; appointment of members to the board of the commission; procedures of the board; the terms and conditions of employment, functions and powers of the Chief Executive Officer; staff and consultants; committees; and reporting and planning obligations of the commission.”

While PHAA is not seeking to provide detailed analysis of the process for the establishment and subsequent operational structure of the Australian Commission for Safety and Quality in Health Care (the Commission), it would like to provide input with regard to the broader context of the implementation of Council of Australian Government (COAG) reforms relating to health and hospitals. PHAA believes that this input is relevant to the proposed functions of the Commission and related establishment of model national accreditation schemes.
