# Attachment and Biobehavioral Catch-Up (ABC)

#### Perth metro: Various sites

Funded by Lotterywest and Channel 7 Telethon Trust

Attachment and Biobehavioral Catch-Up (ABC) is a 10-session home visiting program that supports caregivers in understanding and responding to the needs of their infant and/or toddler.

ABC strengthens the relationship between caregiver and child, helping the child to regulate behaviours and emotions. The program assists caregivers to learn to respond to the child's signals, strengthening their relationship and protecting against stress and early challenges.

Participants must commit to 10 home visits, and consent to the collection of data for service delivery and evaluation.

The program is available to expectant parents in the last trimester of pregnancy and to parents and carers of a child aged up to 24 months where the child has experienced (or is at risk of experiencing) adversity.

#### Being a Parent (BAP)

Perth metro: Various sites

Funded by The Smith Family Licensed by Murdoch Children's Research Institute

Being a Parent (BAP) aims to help parents develop emotional literacy, positive communication, and skills to support children's wellbeing. Week one is an information session, with formal BAP sessions running over the next eight weeks.

At the end of each Being a Parent 9-week series, there is an opportunity for two participating parents to be trained as paid BAP Parent Facilitators.

Each BAP series will be held in one of these eight TSF Communities for Children suburbs:

- Alexander Heights
- Balga
- Girrawheen
- Koondoola
- Marangaroo
- Mirrabooka
- Nollamara
- Westminster

Families can enrol in BAP if they live in one of these eight suburbs, or their children attend school there. The 2023 schedule is TBC.

BAP and Parent Facilitator training is delivered through the evidence-based Empowering Parents Empowering Communities (EPEC) program.

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## Child and Parent Centres

North-West Metro (Banksia Grove) South-West Metro (East Waikiki & Calista) Geraldton (Rangeway) Funded by WA Dept of Education

Child and Parent Centres are a State Government initiative, with the Department of Education as lead agency. There are 22 Centres located on government primary school sites in areas across Western Australia.

Ngala coordinates the Centres at Banksia Grove, Calista, East Waikiki and Rangeway Primary Schools.

The Centres are open to all families in the local community, including those whose children go to neighbouring schools. They provide a welcoming and accessible 'one-stop-shop' for services and support, as well as a place to meet other local families.

The Centres offer early learning, parenting, child and maternal health and wellbeing programs and services that provide support to families with young children, birth to eight years of age, with a focus on children from birth to four years of age.

Programs offered can include playgroup, Sing&Grow, Triple P, Tuning into Kids, parenting and child development workshops, transition to school information sessions, one-to-one consultations, purple book appointments and drop-in clinics.



# Geraldton Family and Youth Support Service (GFYSS)Midwest: GeraldtonFunded by Dept of Communities (CPFS)

The Geraldton Family and Youth Support Service (GYFSS) operates primarily in Geraldton. It provides support to young people and their families, assisting in the development of life skills, personal skills, and social skills.

An early intervention service for young people between 11 and 18 years of age, GFYSS offers individual case management with a strengths-based approach. The service also supports young people to connect with other appropriate services. Referrals can be made through schools, family, self, other agencies and or youth service providers.

Workshops and information resources may be delivered either internally or externally in areas of identified need. For example: healthy relationships, cyber-safety, life skills, sexual health, and adolescent development. These workshops are free of charge to support young people who may be at risk.

# Growing Strong Brains® (GSB)

Growing Strong Brains® (GSB) is an interactive, adaptable and culturally appropriate early brain development resource utilised in several Ngala programs and services. Consisting of a toolkit and manual, GSB promotes awareness and understanding of early brain development science pre-birth and in the early years of a child's life.

It was developed by Ngala in 2014, with funding from the Minderoo Foundation. This process involved consultation with more than 350 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families and service providers from across regional and metropolitan Western Australia.

Using culturally appropriate language, images and activities, the GSB toolkit builds knowledge and understanding of early brain development. It is designed to be used in community by community to meet local cultural and knowledge needs. The topics covered include attachment, nutrition, play and exercise, language and culture, and smoking, drugs and alcohol.

## Home Interaction Program for Parents and Youngsters (HIPPY)

#### Girrawheen, Rockingham, Midland

Funded by Dept of Social Services Licensed by Brotherhood of St Laurence

HIPPY is a free home-based parenting and early childhood enrichment program. The program supports parents to create a learning environment at home to encourage children's love of learning and providing opportunities for parents to enjoy positive time with their child.

A HIPPY Home Tutor visits parents or carers each fortnight to demonstrate a booklet of activities through role-play. The materials provide information about child development and the ways children learn. Resources and support from our tutors increasing parents' confidence as their child's first teacher.

In addition to home visits, HIPPY families also attend monthly gatherings. These gatherings provide a safe, comfortable place for parents and carers to meet other local families, build new friendships and develop new skills.

HIPPY is a national program, with sites throughout Australia. In WA, Ngala operates three HIPPY sites: Girrawheen, Rockingham, and Midland with enrolments taken from surrounding suburbs. Families must be enrolled by 31 May to participate in that year.

Families can enrol in the program two years before their child begins pre-primary, usually around 2 to 3 years of age. Children whose third birthday is between 1st July 2022 and 30th June 2023 are eligible to enrol in HIPPY for 2023.

The Parenting Research Centre (PRC) in Victoria is the national coordinator of MyTime, funded by DSS. Ngala is contracted by PRC to coordinate MyTime in Western Australia. Ngala currently collaborates with 15 service providers across the state to deliver <u>22</u> <u>MyTime groups</u> to local communities, mostly in the metropolitan area.

MyTime aims to enhance parent, carer and family wellbeing through peer support groups. These groups provide a space for parents and carers to come together, share their stories, take part in self-care activities and gain information about parenting and caring for their child.

Ngala Residential Parenting Service (NRPS)	
Extended Stay, Day Stay & Growing Strong Kids	Fee-for-service
Statewide (Kensington-based)	Part-funded by Dept of Communities

Ngala's Residential Parenting Service (NRPS) works within a prevention and early intervention framework to provide specialised support and education to parents.

NRPS is available to parents residing within Western Australia and whose children are aged from birth to six years of age. The interdisciplinary NRPS team build a relationship with parents and carers, working in partnership to develop tailored strategies that build on existing family strengths.

NRPS has two fee-for-service streams: Day Stay and Extended Stay. Admission to the service is via a referral, intake, and triage process. On receipt of a GP or specialist's referral, the family's needs are assessed and prioritised, and the appropriate stay type is allocated. As a registered private hospital, many private health funds fully or partially cover the child and main carer's admission costs.

Both Day Stay and Extended Stay can support families experiencing a range of issues affecting parents and children. This includes adjustment to parenting, child development and behaviour, parent-child relationships, sleep and settling, feeding and nutrition, and

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anxiety and postnatal depression. The team also work alongside families when factors are identified that put them at risk of entering the child protection system, or where there are family of origin issues that impact on parenting and/or family dynamics.

NRPS provides the Growing Strong Kids program, a culturally safe and secure support service for Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal families. Referrals to this program come directly from the Department of Communities, who fund this program.

NRPS families can access short-term one-on-one clinical psychological interventions, as appropriate.

Ngalang Moort Ngalang Kurlangah (Our Family Our Children in Noongar language) is based in Ellenbrook. This free service provides culturally appropriate parenting support for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander parents and carers.

It promotes the development of school readiness in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children through support and education for parents and caregivers.

The team works with families to support strong relationships, positive parenting, and connection to other services in the community. Support is provided through home visits, education sessions in various community settings, and links to local services.

# Nurturing and Parenting Program for Youth (NAPPY)Rockingham & CooloongupFunded by Dept of Social Services

Based on a successful model developed and implemented previously in Kwinana, NAPPY Rockingham is an integrated service providing antenatal and postnatal support. This includes information, education, early learning and development, individual counselling, assistance in accessing community resources, and support to transition into formal education or employment.

NAPPY is targeted at parents between 16 and 25 years of age living in Rockingham or Cooloongup areas, and their children. The service includes weekly extended Parenting and Play Time sessions, offering an opportunity to socialise with other young parents as well as parenting information, role-modelling and education.

NAPPY also offers home visiting and organises excursions to local services and community locations.



The service is delivered by an interdisciplinary team comprised of staff from both Ngala and Kwinana Early Years Services Inc. (KEYS), including a registered nurse, early childhood educator and family support worker.

Ngala provides intensive in-home family support services to Target 120 (T120) families, in partnership with DoC's Community Youth Officer. T120 works with at-risk and recidivist young people and their families to reduce offending behaviour, contributing to a long-term vision of creating safer and more connected communities.

Young people are eligible for the T120 program if they are aged between 10 and 14 years, with three or more recorded Police contacts (including most recent Police contact within the last six months). All participants are referred directly from WAPOL/DoC. T120 families will be prioritised to access all Ngala services, including counselling, parenting support, school readiness programs, and the Child and Parent Centre Rangeway.
