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s	Reduce the timeframe for making claims relating to bulk-billed Medicare and dental services from two years to one year. Update investigative powers in relation to Medicare fraud offences. Streamline pharmacy approval processes under the National Health Act 1953. Enable the Department of Health to manage and alleviate consequences of therapeutic goods shortages and support compliance activities related to unlawful therapeutic and vaping goods.
While these measures aim to improve efficiency and integrity, it is crucial to consider their potential impact on accessibility and equity within our healthcare system.	
Concerns Regarding Accessibility and Equity
