I write to you in support of the Tax Laws Amendment (Public Benefit Test) Bill 2010. I would like to see this Bill passed unchanged. With the recent raid on Agape Ministries, I can't help but wonder why there is tax exemption for religious organisations on the basis of being a religion instead of any actual charitable contribution to society. As it stands the current system in this regard is both open to abuse and inefficient categorisation of organisations that benefit the public.

In these turbulent economic times, proper tax collection without waste is paramount. This bill is needed so honest charitable organisations can claim tax exemption and at the same time deny that benefit to groups who would abuse it.
