If penalty rates were abolished I would be giving up one whole day of my weekend for little financial gain. I pay for my own mobile phone, clothing and entertainment to help my family with their many expenses.

My weekends are important to me because...as a full time student I only get Saturday free and I have homework and chores as well.

I urge the committee to keep penalty rates. People deserve to be rewarded for giving

up their time when others are able to spend their weekends with family, relaxing, catching up with chores and errands that I have to do weekdays. No-one will want to work on weekends if the financial incentive of penalty rates is taken away. We are NOT like third world nations where people are paid a pittance for their efforts. There is a flow-on effect as higher wages means people are able to spend more and support business and contribute to the tax base of the economy. If we don't get paid much we can't spend as much and we don't contribute as much to tax so how will that help the economy?
