**Question:**

CHAIR: Thank you very much, Dr de Toca. I want to go back to your updated vaccination figures. Do you have how many Australians have received their first dose? Is there any way I can see that from the report you do? I don't think there is. We know there are 1.969 total vaccination doses, but presumably that's not 1.96—

Dr Murphy: No, some of those are second doses, particularly in aged care. We do have the breakdown between first and second doses. All of the primary care will be first doses because they're AstraZeneca. Essentially there hasn't been—

CHAIR: Yes, 12 weeks.

Dr Murphy: It's only really with Pfizer that we will have had some second doses. We could get that breakdown for you, but I don't think we've got it with us at the moment.

**Answer:**

The Australian Immunisation Register provides the following breakdown on individuals who have received their first and second doses, with data up to 11:59pm 16 May 2021.
