The submissions dated 31 July 2020 and 3 August 2020 concerned matters solely relating to Australian Border Force. The Minister's office was not provided with a copy of the 31 July 2020 or 3 August 2020 submission and the Department had no formal role in their approval.

The General Counsel and the Assistant Secretary, Royal Commission Legal Branch were consulted by the Australian Government Solicitor in preparing the Voluntary Statement and the Voluntary Submission to the Commission.

The Voluntary Statement was considered by the Deputy Chief Medical Officer and its provision to the Commission was endorsed by the Acting Secretary. The Voluntary Submission was considered by the Acting Chief Medical Officer and its provision to the Commission was endorsed by the Secretary.

The Minister for Health and the Minister's Office were provided a draft of Part 1 and 2 of the Voluntary Statement on 28 May 2020 for noting. The Minister noted the draft of Part 1 and 2 of the Voluntary Statement the same day.

A more advanced draft of the whole Voluntary Statement was provided to the Minister for Health and the Minister's Office for noting on 5 June 2020. On 10 June 2020, the Minister sought a short introductory preamble be included at the beginning of Part 2 of the Voluntary Statement, which appears at paragraphs 9 and 10 of the final Voluntary Statement. On 11 June 2020, the Minister noted the whole Voluntary Statement. On 12 June 2020, the Minister's Office was provided with a copy of the final Voluntary Statement.

The Minister for Health and the Minister's Office were provided a draft of the Voluntary Submission on 15 July 2020 for noting. On 16 July 2020, the Minister noted the Voluntary Submission.

The Voluntary Submission and the Voluntary Statement were provided to the Minister and the Minister's Office as a matter of standard practice, to be consulted on matters pertaining to the portfolio.

The Commonwealth has provided a detailed account of the events surrounding the disembarkation of the Ruby Princess to the NSW Special Commission of Inquiry into the Ruby Princess (Commission) in its submissions to the Commission.

The Commonwealth provided four voluntary submissions to the Commission dated 12 June 2020, 16 July 2020, 31 July 2020 and 3 August 2020.

The Department tabled the four submissions to the Senate Select Committee on COVID-19. These are also publically available through the Commission's website.

The Australian Government requires international cruise ships not to enter Australian ports through a legislative instrument made by the Health Minister on 18 March 2020 (*Biosecurity (Human Biosecurity Emergency) (Human Coronavirus with Pandemic Potential) (Emergency Requirements) Determination 2020*) (the Determination).

On 20 May 2020, the Determination was extended until 17 September 2020 and will be reviewed again shortly.

The Government is considering the recommendations from the Commission handed down on the 14 August 2020, and has already begun reviewing its policies, training and supervision arrangements at ports.
