week, which gives me more time to focus on my studies.

If penalty rates were abolished, I would have to work more hours in order to support myself in order to pay rent, utilities, rego and vehicle costs, student fees, etc. As a result, I'd have less time to study and what little free time I already have to socialise and catch up with my family and friends would likely be gone.

My weekends are important to me because it gives me time to catch up on my study and seeing friends and family that I don't get a chance to do throughout the week. Slashing penalty rates would mean working longer hours on the weekend and compromising my other life priorities.

I urge the committee to keep penalty rates. The higher costs of living, combined with the stress of my work load and study load is tough enough to manage. A substantial percentage of my income is from penalty rates and I don't know how I'll manage without them.
