Re: Treatment of injured and ill employees

The Faculty of Occupational and Environmental Medicine (AFOEM) is part of the Royal Australasian College of Physicians. The Policy and Advocacy Committee of AFOEM has developed policy on the care of employees with work injuries. The document was widely distributed for pubic comment, and the feedback received has been incorporated.

Whilst the policy document has not formally been launched, it seemed appropriate to provide our policy review to this important Senate Inquiry. The policy document is labelled as *draft* as it has not been formally launched, any further changes are likely to be minor.

It covers all occupational/work groupings, and understands the nature of such work in terms of inherent task requirements, environment, and human ergonomics.
