

**Public Hearing: Tuesday 28 February 2023**

**Opening statement**

The Pharmaceutical Society of Australia (PSA) is the peak national professional pharmacy organisation representing all of Australia's 36,000 pharmacists working in all sectors and across all locations. PSA is the profession's standards-setting body and the custodian of standards, guidelines and code of ethics which are fundamental to articulating pharmacists' scope of practice and ensuring quality and integrity in the professional practice of pharmacists.

Central to the pharmacy profession's remit is a commitment to person-centred care, evidence-based best practice, collaborative team care arrangements and quality improvement. PSA believes medication safety, quality use of medicines, and timely access to equitable and affordable healthcare interventions are important facets to improving reproductive health care in Australia.

PSA fully supports the approach to ensuring patient safety as a priority, improving timely and affordable access, and strengthening delivery of collaborative health care. Further, pharmacists are well-placed to deliver public health and preventive care messages, contribute to improvements in health literacy and digital literacy, and support and empower patient choice and informed decision-making.
