Inspector-General of Aged Care Bill 2023 [Provisions] and the Inspector-General of Aged Care (Consequential and Transitional Provisions) Bill 2023 [Provisions]

(acute, residential, community and in-home care), depending on their health needs. Being at the forefront of aged care, and caring for older people over the twenty-four hour period in acute care, residential facilities and the community, our members are in a prime position to make clear recommendations to improve the care provided and enhance processes for access to that care.

The ANMF welcomes the opportunity to provide a response to the Inspector-General of Aged Care Bill 2023 and the Inspector-General of Aged Care (Consequential and Transitional Provisions) Bill 2023.

The ANMF supports in principle the intention of the Bills to form the role of the Inspector-General and ensure the role remains independent, enabling systemic reviews of aged care delivery. However, the ANMF is gravely concerned that the legislation does not require the Inspector-General position or the office of the Inspector-General to have clinical expertise and experience. An evidence based clinical lens, which underpins all decisions made in relation to the role and function of the Inspector-General, is essential to guarantee safe quality care provision. To omit the expertise of health practitioners within the office of the Inspector-General, or indeed themselves and on its advisory committees weather by oversight or design risks continuing the failures of the current system to ensure consumers have access to health care as required.
