1	The committee recommends that the bill not be passed.	On 14 June 2023, the Government introduced the Counter-Terrorism Legislation
2	The committee recommends that the government considers introducing its own bill as a matter of urgency, taking into consideration the issues raised above.	Amendment (Prohibited Hate Symbols and Other Measures) Bill 2023. The Bill (now Act) passed both houses of parliament on 6 December 2023, and received Royal Assent on 11 December 2023.
Dissenting Report		The Act amended the Criminal Code Act 1995 (Criminal Code) to establish new criminal
1	That the Bill be passed with an amendment providing that a review be undertaken following its operation for an appropriate period.	 offences for the public display of prohibited Nazi and terrorist organisation symbols and publicly performing the Nazi salute; and trading in goods that bear a prohibited symbol. The Act also amended the Criminal Code to: establish new criminal offences for using a carriage service for violent extremist material; and possessing or controlling violent extremist material obtained or accessed using a carriage service. expand the offence of advocating terrorism in section 80.2C of the Criminal Code to include instructing on the doing of a terrorist act and praising the doing of a terrorist act in specified circumstances; and increase the maximum penalty for the advocating terrorism offence from 5 to 7 years imprisonment. remove the sunsetting requirement for instruments which list terrorist organisations and bolster safeguards.
2	If the Government wishes to propose its own Bill, then such a Bill should be prepared as a matter of urgency (as per recommendation 2 of the Majority Report), taking into account the submissions made as part of this enquiry process.
