To Whom It May Concern:

I have worked for a Wind Farm development company for the last six years. In this time I have had lots of contact with landowners with either developed Wind Farms on site or with proposed wind farms earmarked for their land. In my experience, all of these landowners have been nothing but positive about the developments, with complaints arising from those of neighboring properties only who are not stakeholders.
