Brief Notes for your information.

- 1. I have been interested in the question of 'Climate Change' for some 20 years.

- 4. If any empirical evidence was available to support the theory of anthropogenic global warming (AGW) I would readily accept it.

- 6. I have been active in the NSW Farmers Association, the NFF and have been a member of numerous Government Committees in the environmental area including the National Biodiversity Advisory Council, National Farm Forestry Round Table, the NSW State Catchment Management Coordinating Committee, NSW Water Advisory Council.
- 7. I am currently Chair of the NSW Farmers Association Carbon Pollution Reduction Scheme Committee.
- 8. This submission however is a tendered as a private individual.

I would be interested in appearing before the Senate Committee Inquiry when it is held in Wagga Wagga, to answer any questions that may be raised or to expand on any of the issues or concepts raised in my submission.

This Inquiry covers one of the most important areas with significant environmental, social and economic consequences not only for farmers but for the whole Australian population.

The submission highlights areas of scientific doubt sufficient to warrant a Royal Commission or equivalent Inquiry.
