Inquiry into Fair Work Amendment (Small Business Penalty Rates Exemption) Bill 2012

I refer to the Committee hearing held on 7 December 2012 and provide the following further information as requested on notice by the respective Senators:

Minimum Wage increases requested by Senator Xenophon

It was pointed out during the hearing on 7 December 2012 that hourly rates have increased exponentially since the introduction of the Modern Restaurant Industry Award to the extent that some businesses are now forced to pay hourly wage rates during the week that they used to pay employees inclusive of all penalty rates under the pre modern award system. To illustrate this point the following examples are provided:

Example 1

For a Casual Kitchen Hand at Café Good Coffee in the Melbourne hourly rates have changed as follows.

- In 2008 a Kitchen Hand was earning \$22.13 an hour on Sundays.
- In 2012 a Kitchen Hand is earning \$25.45 an hour on Sundays.

The same Kitchen Hand is earning \$22.20 an hour Monday to Friday for work between midnight and

7AM which is more than what was earned on a Sunday in 2008.

Classification: Kitchen Hand Grade 1 (Level 1)

Example 2

A Casual Waiter at Mr Italian Restaurant in Brisbane hourly rates have changed as follows:

- In 2008 a Casual Waiter was earning \$17.87 an hour on a Sunday.
- In 2012 a Casual Waiter is earning \$25.93 an hour on a Sunday.

The same Casual Waiter is earning \$22.00 an hour Monday to Friday for work between 10PM and Midnight which is more than what was earned on a Sunday in 2008.

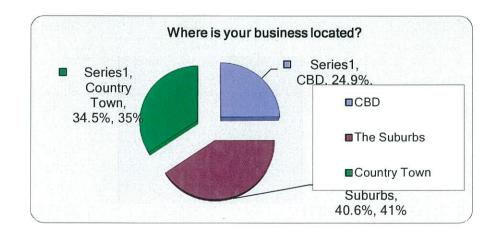

The above examples illustrate the substantial labour cost increases for new incorporated businesses set up after 27 March 2006 and transitioning to the Modern Restaurant Industry Award. It is recognised that for businesses bound by pre Modern Awards, labour costs fluctuate from state to state and in some cases penalty rates are phasing downwards. However, even these businesses are often impacted by increases in other areas that did not apply under the respective state award such as late night penalty rates of 10% between 10PM and midnight and 15% for work performed between midnight and 7AM Monday to Friday.

Regional Markets Information requested by Senator McKenzie

The following data was extracted the Restaurant & Catering Benchmarking Report in 2012:

"Suburban restaurants and catering operations accounted 40.6% of all business in the survey, as illustrated in Figure 3-3, this is down by approximately 3.5% from 2010 survey data. 34.5% of respondents were located in regional centres or large country towns, this is consistent with 2010 data. The remaining businesses were located in the City Business District 24.9% and increase of 3.1% from 2010."

It should be recognised that data recording the reasons for business failure are often categorised into broad areas that do not drill down into the exact causal grounds such as excessive labour costs. The following data provided from the ABS detail the broad grounds as follows:
