Senator FISHER asked:

Can the department address on notice the risks identified in Minter Ellison's risk register in respect of which the risk register says no residual risk value tolerable—yes or no. In respect of those risks, where the risk register indicates a 'no' to that question—those being risk 2, risk 3 and risk 7—can the department on notice address what may be the basis for the Prime Minister's comments in respect of those risks which the risk register identifies are not tolerable—that is, 'no'—at the time the report was provided and the basis upon which the Prime Minister might have then seen it appropriate to indicate they were 'capable of managing the risk', in his words, or either effective or capable of tolerably managing the risk? **Ms Kruk**—I will take that on notice.

Senator BIRMINGHAM asked:

How many houses per week or month have been installed and how has this differed from expectations/ budgets?

Answer/s:

A budget allocation of 90,000 installations was apportioned across each month. While this number of installations was not reached in the initial phase of the Home Insulation Program, by the end of August 2009, claims had surpassed the notional monetary budget allocation figure.
