CHAIR: I'm just going to ask a couple of questions that may need to be taken on notice. Do we have the average length of time that people are on compulsory income management?

Mr Boneham: I think we may have answered that in the last questions on notice. I think the average time is around three and a quarter years.

CHAIR: What's the longest period of time that someone has been on it? Mr Boneham: I'll just find that. So, 1,180 days is the average time.

CHAIR: Is that aggregated for Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people?

Mr Boneham: It's all participants. CHAIR: Do you have that data?

Mr Boneham: I'd have to take that on notice and see if we've got that breakdown.

CHAIR: If you could, that would be really useful. Is it possible to do that by state and territory

as well, that is, the average length of time?

Mrs Hope: We can certainly try to get that for you.

CHAIR: That would be useful.
