Inquiry into the 2022 federal election Submission 3



My comments on these Terms of Reference

That the Committee inquire into and report on all aspects of the 2022 federal election and related matters, including consideration of:

- (a) reforms to political donation laws, particularly the applicability of 'real-time' disclosure and a reduction of the disclosure threshold to a fixed \$1,000; A very good idea. It will provide real time tracking for authorities to monitor donations.
- (b) potential reforms to funding of elections, particularly regarding electoral expenditure caps and public funding of parties and candidates; If you are proposing to treat unions as individual entities that have a right to donate to the Labor party individually then this is a backward step and abuse of power. Labor are already accepting funds from individual unions and this will give them an unfair electoral advantage and stop other legitimate parties fundraising.
- (c) the potential for 'truth in political advertising' laws to enhance the integrity and transparency of the electoral system; Not a bad idea but how will it be enforced.
- (d) encouraging increased electoral participation and lifting enfranchisement of First Nations People; It will be interesting on how you propose to do this. There is a presumption that Labor has the sway in remote aboriginal communities.
- (e) the potential for the creation of a single national electoral roll capable of being used for all federal, state and territory elections in Australia; This isn't such a bad idea as I believe this will cut costs for the AEC
- (f) encouraging increased electoral participation and supporting enfranchisement generally, and specifically in relation to:
- i. accessibility of enrolment and voting for persons with a disability; agree
 ii. voting rights of Australians abroad; only if they are Australian citizens
 iii. Australian permanent residents and new Australian citizens; and the last time I looked at the constitution you have to be an Australian citizen to vote in either federal or state elections
 iv. New Zealand citizens residing in Australia; and the last time I looked at the constitution you have to be an Australian citizen to vote in either federal or state elections
- (g) proportional representation of the states and territories in the Parliament, in the context of the democratic principle of 'one vote, one value'. If this means more house of reps and senators for Canberra and NT then I don't believe this is right. Both of these territories have small populations and this means they will be over represented in both houses.

Other Ideas:

- (1) Production of identification when you vote
- (2) Get rid of party volunteers congregating outside of polling booths hassling voters
