Resources promoting the development of phonemic awareness in learners are conspicuously missing from adult literacy provider sites. Sites that do have a focus on the Science of Reading tend to be aligned with supporting people with learning disabilities, such as SPELD SA or are speech pathology sites, e.g. Spelfabet)

- TAE80113 Graduate Diploma of Adult Language, Literacy and Numeracy Practice
- TAE80213 Graduate Diploma of Adult Language, Literacy and Numeracy Leadership
- TAFE Statement in Volunteer Literacy Tutor Training 800-000752 (I undertook this in 2018 and deemed it unsuitable for our adult literacy service)
