Senator Stirling Griff asked:

How many people who were previously sent to Nauru and PNG are currently in Australia?

Of these:

- How many are currently in an Immigration Detention Centre/Facility or Immigration Transit Accommodation (not Alternative Place of Detention) (broken down by State/Territory)?
- How many are currently in an Alternative Place of Detention (broken down by State/Territory)?
- How many are currently subject to a Residence Determination (broken down by State/Territory)?
- How many are currently residing in the community on a Bridging visa? (broken down by State/Territory)

Answer:

As at 31 December 2019, there were 1,221 transitory persons in Australia from Nauru and PNG.

- Of these, 254 were held in immigration detention.
