 - (i) rent assistance as a percentage of median weekly rent in WA has dropped from 31.8 per cent in June 2001 to 20.4 per cent in June 2007 and in the ACT from 25.6 per cent in June 1998 to 17.4 per cent in June 2007;
 - (j) overall, renting has become less affordable nationally even for those in receipt of CRA;
 - (k) according to national figures from the Australian Government Housing data set in June 2006, over one-third of CRA recipients pay more than 30 per cent of their income on rent, after CRA is factored in; and
 - (l) public housing approvals have plummeted to 131 new council approvals in March 2008, well short of the Australian Bureau of Statistics' decade average of 350 new public housing approvals monthly; and
 - (3) calls on the Federal Government to:

- (a) work with State governments through COAG to urgently address the national shortage of public, not for profit and private housing including delays in local government development approvals;
- (b) urgently review the adequacy of CRA paid to those on low and fixed incomes;
- (c) investigate making CRA or similar payment available to eligible recipients who are purchasing their own homes and who are experiencing severe mortgage stress, with the aim of keeping people in their own homes and taking some of the pressures off the public and private sector rental market;
- (d) consider changing the CRA formula to reflect the lack of choice and the increasing cost of rent beyond inflation, by linking CRA to actual rent using the highest median rent in each area;
- (e) target a proportion of assistance for development of housing in high employment growth areas, in recognition that for those looking for work in areas of high labour demand, high rents are acting as a disincentive for some people to escape the poverty cycle; and
- (f) pay particular attention to development options for multi-dwelling supported accommodation models to provide for those with disabilities who may formally have been housed in institutions. (*Notice given 20 October 2008. Time allowed—20 minutes.*)

†3 **MR DANBY:** To move—That the House:

- (1) congratulates Mr Morgan Tsvangirai, leader of the Movement for Democratic Change (MDC), on his appointment as Prime Minister of Zimbabwe, which is a just recognition of his long struggle for democracy and reform in Zimbabwe;
- (2) acknowledges the courage of the people of Zimbabwe in defying the thuggery and intimidation of the Mugabe regime in voting for a change of regime at the Zimbabwe elections of March 2008;

- (5) calls on the Australian Government to render every assistance to Mr Tsvangirai in carrying out the reforms urgently needed to restore democratic elections, good government and economic prosperity to the long-suffering people of Zimbabwe.  - (h) according to an AusDiab study, in 2002 the social and medical costs of diabetes in Australia were estimated to total \$6 billion annually;

- (2) acknowledges the work of Professor Martin Silink AM MD FRACP, as President of the International Diabetes Federation and his colleagues world-wide for their work to ensure that this United Resolution was carried;
- (3) recognises that:
 - (a) in the catalogue of chronic illness, few conditions would be more needful of attention than the scourge of diabetes;
 - (b) the prevention and management of diabetes are the responsibility of the whole of society;
 - (c) parliaments should play a leading role in promoting community education and implementing effective policies and health-care for sufferers of this world-wide scourge;
 - (d) left undiagnosed and untreated, diabetes dramatically affects quality of life and shortens life span and its malevolent course inevitably leads to many serious associated health complications including heart disease, stroke, renal failure, limb amputation and blindness; and
 - (e) unless national governments act to deliver comprehensive policies, the implications for health budgets will be calamitous; and
- (4) calls on the Government to:
 - (a) continue to make diabetes a National Health Priority;
 - (b) commission a Productivity Commission Report into the real and increasing cost of diabetes to the community;
 - (c) adequately fund best practice medicine for the treatment of diabetes; and
 - (d) continue to promote healthy lifestyle programs, especially targeted to children and young people. (*Notice given 23 October 2008.*)

- (d) the right to life is a fundamental human right recognised in the *Universal Declaration of Human Rights* (1948) and the *International Covenant of Civil and Political Rights* (1966);
 - (e) Australia is also a party to the Second Optional Protocol to the *International Covenant of Civil and Political Rights* aimed at the universal abolition of the death penalty;
 - (f) both Australia and Indonesia are signatories to the *International Covenant of Civil and Political Rights*;
 - (g) the Australian Parliament passed the *Death Penalty Abolition Act 1973* without dissent;
 - (h) Article 28 A of the *Indonesian Constitution* recognises the right to life;
 - (i) respect for human life and human dignity are values common to Australia and Indonesia;
 - (j) abhorrence of the death penalty is a fundamental value in Australian society and there is bipartisan opposition within the Australian Parliament to the death penalty; and
 - (k) the Indonesian Constitutional Court recommended in October 2007 that Indonesian criminal law be amended to include a provision which allows for the death penalty not to be mandatory and for prisoners to earn a commutation of a death sentence by rehabilitation and remorse for their crime;
- (2) believes that abolition of the death penalty contributes to the enhancement of human dignity and progressive development of human rights;
- (3) is convinced that all measures for abolition of the death penalty should be considered as important and essential progress in the enjoyment of the right to life;
- (4) records:
- (a) its opposition to the imposition of the death penalty;
 - (b) its abhorrence of all drug related crime;
 - (c) the importance of close cooperation between Australian and Indonesian law enforcement agencies in the prevention, detection and prosecution of drug related crime; and
 - (d) the importance to Australia of its continuing excellent relationship with our near neighbour, the Republic of Indonesia; and
- (5) requests that:
- (a) the House incorporate into domestic law the contents of the Second Optional Protocol to the *International Covenant of Civil and Political Rights* to ensure the unequivocal abolition of the death penalty in Australia and to communicate Australia's position on the death penalty to the world at large;
 - (b) the Commonwealth advocate clemency for these three Australian citizens, as and whenever appropriate;
 - (c) the Indonesian Government favourably consider the Constitutional Court's second recommendation that Indonesian criminal law be reformed so that there is a sentencing alternative to the mandatory death penalty;
 - (d) the President and the people of Indonesia understand Australia's principled position in relation to the imposition of the death penalty; and
 - (e) in the event that remaining legal process fails, the President of Indonesia extend clemency to the three young Australian citizens sentenced to death, in particular, by commuting their sentences to terms of imprisonment.  - (3) urges the Government to establish a mechanism to address outstanding issues and anomalies in the military honours system such as recognising the courageous deeds of people such as Ordinary Seaman Teddy Sheean on 1 December 1942. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 5 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)
- 11 EPIDERMOLYSIS BULLOSA:** Resumption of debate (*from 15 September 2008—Mr Zappia, in continuation*) on the motion of Mr Morrison—That the House:
- (1) notes that Epidermolysis Bullosa (EB) is a rare genetic condition characterised by skin fragility and blister formation, which is incurable and in its most severe forms can be fatal in infancy and childhood;
 - (2) notes that children afflicted by EB are known as “butterfly children” and are required to pierce, drain and dress their blisters each day in an endless routine that lasts up to three hours in the most severe cases;

 - (4) acknowledges the support and assistance provided to sufferers and their families by DebRA Australia, the national Dystrophic Epidermolysis Bullosa research association;
 - (5) recognises that families with a child suffering from EB have problems accessing dressings because of expense or availability from the public system, and in the more severe cases families must spend up to \$5,300 per month on dressings; and
 - (6) calls on the Australian Government to establish a 12 month trial program, managed by the Department of Health and Ageing in partnership with DebRA, to:
 - (a) fund delivery of dressings directly to patients currently registered on the Australasian EB registry from suppliers identified through a public tender process;
 - (b) provide access to a dedicated nurse in each state and territory for patients suffering from EB; and
 - (c) review the program upon conclusion, with a view to establishing a permanent scheme. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 5 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)

 - (6) notes also Australia's commitment to, and support for, reform of the United Nations' system in order to ensure that the organisation reflects today's world and is able to function efficiently and effectively; and
 - (7) reaffirms the faith of the Australian people in the purposes and principles of the United Nations Charter. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 8 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)

 - (2) urges the Australian Government to send the appropriate Minister and appropriate Shadow Minister as leaders of an Australian delegation to the Asia-Pacific Microcredit Summit in Bali in July 2008. - 3 **OVARIAN CANCER:** Resumption of debate (*from 26 May 2008*) on the motion of Ms Owens—That the House:
- (1) that Ovarian Cancer Awareness Week will be held from 24 February to 2 March 2008;
 - (2) that ovarian cancer is the sixth most common cause of cancer death in women, with nearly 1,200 Australian diagnoses each year and nearly 800 Australian deaths from it each year;
 - (3) that when ovarian cancer is diagnosed at an early stage, the outlook is very good—as many as 90 per cent of women diagnosed early are cured. However, 75 per cent of women are diagnosed at the advanced stage when it is very difficult to treat;
 - (4) that it is a devastating disease that is difficult to diagnose early and treat at an advanced stage. A woman dies every 10 hours largely because of the lack of early detection tests and poor knowledge of the disease throughout the community;
 - (5) that a recent Senate Community Affairs inquiry into gynaecological cancer in Australia (tabled 27 February 2007) identified a need for increased awareness amongst the broader community about gynaecological cancers and symptoms and better educational support for general practitioners;
 - (6) that a survey commissioned by the National Breast Cancer Centre has revealed that half of all Australian women believe incorrectly that a pap smear will detect ovarian cancer and that 56 per cent of women are unable to correctly name any signs or symptoms of the disease; and
 - (7) the need for greater focus on education and additional research funding to help Australian scientists to find early detection markers and more effective treatments of this insidious disease. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority 10 November 2008.*)
- 4 **BLOOD DONATION:** Resumption of debate (*from 2 June 2008*) on the motion of Mr Hayes—That the House:
- (1) recognises and celebrates the significant contribution which Australia's voluntary donors make to the Australian community as we approach World Blood Donor Day in June 2008;
 - (2) recognises that whilst one in three people will at some stage require blood, presently only one in thirty people actually donate blood;

- (3) supports the efforts of the selfless individuals who give their blood to help save the lives and improve the health of people whom they may never meet;

- 5 **BOTANY BAY AND THE KURNELL PENINSULA:** Resumption of debate (*from 2 June 2008*) on the motion of Mr Morrison—That the House:
- (1) recognises that:
 - (a) the Kurnell Peninsula of southern Sydney is the traditional land of the Gweagal people of the Dharawal nation;
 - (b) the landing site of Lieutenant James Cook on April 29, 1770 at Kurnell is the modern birthplace of our nation and is recognised on the National Heritage List;
 - (c) the village of Kurnell is a strong local community comprising approximately 700 homes;
 - (d) Botany Bay is a valuable marine environment providing sanctuary for migratory birdlife and habitat for territorial marine creatures; and
 - (e) construction of the desalination pipeline has commenced across Botany Bay from the Kurnell Peninsula, under approval as critical infrastructure by the New South Wales State Government;
 - (2) expresses concern that:
 - (a) Part 3A of the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979* in New South Wales exempts critical infrastructure projects from all planning instruments and codes that might otherwise apply, precludes third party rights of appeal and limits powers and penalties in relation to enforcement of breaches of conditions;
 - (b) due to the use of Part 3A of the Act, the impacts of the construction of this pipeline on the marine environment and cultural heritage of Botany Bay and the Kurnell Peninsula are unknown; and
 - (c) since construction has commenced, there have been a series of breaches in relation to the failure of silt nets to contain land fill on Silver Beach at Kurnell; sheet piling testing has exceeded nominated noise vibration benchmarks, posing a threat to resident property; and there is concern in the community about the ongoing impacts and failures of this project; and
 - (3) calls on the Minister for the Environment, Heritage and the Arts to protect the physical environment and cultural heritage of Botany Bay and the Kurnell Peninsula by requesting the New South Wales State Government to:
 - (a) prepare a comprehensive environmental remediation plan to address the impact of developing the desalination plant, including the pipeline across Botany Bay;
 - (b) conduct such environmental studies as are required to determine the impact of the development of the desalination plant and associated pipeline on the environment, and to make such studies available to the public;
 - (c) ensure that the development of environmental remediation plans is a requirement for any future referred approvals for critical infrastructure projects to the Commonwealth by the New South Wales Government that are subject to Part 3A of the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979*;
 - (d) prepare a heritage and community remediation plan that addresses the impact and disruption caused to residents and the area by the construction of the desalination plant and associated pipeline; and
 - (e) ensure the New South Wales State Government and its agents monitor and report on the ongoing impacts of the project and commit to informing residents in advance of any issues that may impact on residents or their local environment. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on the next sitting Monday after 10 November 2008.*)

- 6 **PLASTIC AND GLASS BOTTLES:** Resumption of debate (*from 2 June 2008*) on the motion of Mr Scott—That the House:
- (1) calls on the Federal Government to commit to ban by the year 2012 the inclusion of all plastic and glass bottles in landfill;
 - (2) notes the ban would be supported by implementation of a national program providing a cash refund for all plastic and glass bottles;

 - (7) more resources and funding is critical to the future success of Australia's HIV/AIDS strategies; and
 - (8) all policy and decision makers have an obligation to ensure HIV/AIDS sufferers and their families are given the best possible options for long term health management. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 3 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)
- 12 **URBAN PLANNING:** Resumption of debate (*from 23 June 2008—Mr Hawke, in continuation*) on the motion of Mr Ripoll—That the House:
- (1) notes that:
 - (a) urban planning is an essential part of dealing with Australia's future growth and addresses important areas such as jobs, housing, infrastructure and sustainable transport;
 - (b) urban planning requires broad participation from all tiers of government and various sectors to help shape future directions and developments;
 - (c) urban planning fosters quality planning which will create sustainable Australian communities which produce social, cultural, economic and environmental benefits for all; and
 - (d) if the nation is to have an agenda for prosperity—both economic and social—we must search for long term solutions; and
 - (2) supports:
 - (a) positive initiatives by the current Government to address future growth such as the establishment of Infrastructure Australia; and
 - (b) policies, projects and initiatives that deliver long term solution for Australia's future planning needs and not for each electoral cycle. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 3 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)
- 13 **PALESTINIAN-ISRAELI CONFLICT:** Resumption of debate (*from 1 September 2008*) on the motion of Ms Vamvakinou—That the House:
- (1) recognises the social, economic and human cost of the current Palestinian-Israeli conflict;
 - (2) notes the broader implications of the Palestinian-Israeli conflict in terms of regional stability as well as diplomatic relations in the Middle East;
 - (3) condemns all forms of violence as an obstacle to peace;
 - (4) supports the renewal of diplomatic efforts to negotiate a just and lasting peace and recognises the efforts of the Quartet-led Road Map to peace in the Middle East;
 - (5) notes the Middle East peace initiative formally announced by Saudi Arabia's Crown Prince Abdullah during a meeting of the Arab League Summit in Beirut in March 2003;
 - (6) acknowledges that a negotiated settlement to the Palestinian-Israeli conflict must necessarily involve both parties reaching agreement on final status issues, including the status of Jerusalem, the Right of Return for Palestinian refugees, settlements, security, borders and water;
 - (7) supports the Australian Government's recent decision to increase Australia's development assistance program to the Palestinian Territories; and
 - (8) believes that Australia has an important role to play as a middle power in encouraging peace initiatives between Palestinians and Israelis that are consistent with Australia's commitment to multilateral diplomacy, responsible international citizenship and the principles of international law. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 4 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)
- 14 **FRANCHISEES:** Resumption of debate (*from 1 September 2008*) on the motion of Mr Randall—That the House:
- (1) recognises the severe financial distress and hardship faced by a number of current and former franchisees throughout Australia as a direct result of franchisor conduct;

- (2) acknowledges that franchisors must be held accountable for their unconscionable conduct, including non-disclosure, through a more stringent and determined application of existing Trade Practices legislation;
 - (3) notes that there are many franchisees that have no adequate or available means to redress their grievances without recourse or expensive and often unaffordable litigation; and
 - (4) considers the introduction of provisions, similar to those available in industrial relations legislation, for mediation, conciliation and arbitration, at no cost to the franchisee. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 4 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)
- 15 **INTERCOUNTRY ADOPTION—MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF STATEMENT:** Resumption of debate (*from 2 September 2008*) on the motion of Mr Pyne—That the House take note of the statement. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 4 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)
- 16 **INFRASTRUCTURE:** Resumption of debate (*from 15 September 2008*) on the motion of Mr Ripoll—That the House:
- (1) notes that:
 - (a) infrastructure planning provides the platform for regional economic growth;
 - (b) the rapid growth in many regional centres has placed the nation's infrastructure network under significant pressure;
 - (c) the changing social and demographic environment in major regional centres presents significant economic and development challenges; and
 - (d) the past 12 years have been a missed opportunity for the nation to invest in the future beyond the current mining boom; and
 - (2) supports the Government's:
 - (a) agenda of creating a stronger and more participatory regional development structure through the establishment of Infrastructure Australia, Regional Development Australia and the Major Cities Unit; and
 - (b) commitment to regional development and the delivery of regionally significant infrastructure. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 5 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)
- 17 **YOUR WATER YOUR SAY:** Resumption of debate (*from 15 September 2008*) on the motion of Mr Broadbent—That the House:
- (1) notes the recent decision of the Federal Court to award costs against the incorporated community group, Your Water Your Say, following an unsuccessful action against the Australian and Victorian Governments in relation to the proposed construction of a Water Desalination plant at Wonthaggi, in the Electorate of McMillan;
 - (2) recognises that community groups such as Your Water Your Say:
 - (a) have a democratic right to express their legitimate concerns about the environmental impact of major infrastructure projects;
 - (b) have the right to pursue their concerns through legal action if they consider these concerns are not being properly addressed; and
 - (c) should not be constrained from seeking recourse to legal process because of a threat of onerous costs; and
 - (3) calls on the Australian Government to:
 - (a) waive the court costs awarded to the Commonwealth as a result of the failed court action by Your Water Your Say; and
 - (b) agree not to pursue individual members of Your Water Your Say for the recovery of the costs. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 5 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)
- 18 **SOCIAL SECURITY AGREEMENT WITH THE UNITED KINGDOM:** Resumption of debate (*from 15 September 2008*) on the motion of Ms Rishworth—That the House:
- (1) notes with concern, the previous Government's termination of Australia's Social Security Agreement with the United Kingdom in March 2001;
 - (2) notes:

- (a) that the termination of this agreement led to a lost opportunity for the previous Australian Government to negotiate indexation of the British pension for those British migrants living in Australia;
 - (b) that many British pensioners made substantial contributions to the United Kingdom's National Insurance system but many have not received an increase in their British pension for a decade, and as a result their payment has not kept up with the cost of living; and
 - (c) that the United Kingdom has entered into social security agreements that include pension indexation with many other nations, including the United States, Israel and Switzerland;
- (3) calls on the Commonwealth Government to commence negotiations for a new social security agreement with the United Kingdom that includes provisions for the indexation of British pensions. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 5 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)
- 19 **HUMAN RIGHTS IN TIBET:** Resumption of debate (*from 15 September 2008*) on the motion of Mr Slipper—That the House:
- (1) notes:
 - (a) the continuing human rights concerns in Tibet; and
 - (b) the continuing restrictions on entry to Tibetan areas for journalists, international observers, non-government agencies and foreign diplomats;
 - (2) welcomes the informal talks between the Chinese Government and representatives of His Holiness, the 14th Dalai Lama on 4 and 5 May 2008 in Shenzhen, China, and the agreement to hold a further round of the China-Tibet dialogue;
 - (3) encourages both parties to work sincerely towards a peaceful and mutually agreed resolution on the China-Tibet issue;
 - (4) welcomes the Prime Minister's forthright statements to the Chinese Premier and President in public and in private on the need for constructive dialogue during his recent visit to China;
 - (5) recognises that the China-Tibet issue was also raised with the Chinese authorities by the former Government;
 - (6) acknowledges there is bi-partisan support in the Australian Parliament for a peaceful resolution on the differences between Tibet and China; and
 - (7) requests the Government actively to support and monitor progress of the China-Tibet dialogue and to offer its support to help bring about a positive outcome. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 5 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)
- 20 **PROSTATE CANCER:** Resumption of debate (*from 15 September 2008*) on the motion of Mr Bradbury—That the House:
- (1) notes that September is Prostate Cancer Awareness Month;
 - (2) notes that prostate cancer is the most common cancer in men after skin cancer and the second highest cause of male cancer deaths;
 - (3) acknowledges the work of the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia in promoting greater awareness of prostate cancer within the broader community and the need for men to undergo regular testing; and
 - (4) congratulates the Rudd Government for developing Australia's first ever men's health policy. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 5 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)
- 21 **AGE PENSION:** Resumption of debate (*from 22 September 2008*) on the motion of Dr Jensen—That the House encourages the Government to lift the amount that a person in receipt of an Age Pension can earn from productive employment to an amount equivalent to the senior Australian's tax offset before applying a penalty that reduces their Age Pension payment. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 6 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)
- 22 **HUMAN TRAFFICKING:** Resumption of debate (*from 22 September 2008*) on the motion of Ms Rea—That the House:
- (1) notes that:
 - (a) the insidious act of human trafficking is the second largest criminal activity in the world, and certainly the fastest growing; and

- (b) the Australian Government is committed to a “whole of government” approach to tackling human trafficking; and
 - (2) recognises that the Australian Government, through its Asia Regional Trafficking in Persons aid project and contribution to UNICEF’s work, continues to play an active role in strengthening the key institutions responsible for identifying and addressing human trafficking;
 - (3) acknowledges the role of the Non Government Organisations (NGO), their unique expertise and the assistance they provide to trafficked persons;
 - (4) recognises that the Australian Government continues to work with AusAID, NGOs and foreign governments to ensure that the crime of human trafficking is continually brought to light, and that all Members and Senators continue to raise awareness of this international human rights violation; and
 - (5) applauds the Government’s establishment of a National Round Table on people trafficking as a measure to involve all interested stakeholders in the fight against this despicable crime. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 6 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)
- 23 **CREDIT CARD LIMITS:** Resumption of debate (*from 22 September 2008*) on the motion of Mr Scott—That the House:
- (1) calls on the Federal Government to amend finance legislation so as to prevent credit providers from sending unsolicited letters offering an increased credit limit to credit card holders; and
 - (2) notes the amended legislation would stipulate that for a credit card limit to be increased, the card holder must make the first approach to the credit provider. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 6 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)
- 24 **INTERNATIONAL DAY OF DEMOCRACY:** Resumption of debate (*from 25 September 2008—Ms Grierson*) on the motion of Ms Parke—That the House:
- (1) notes that, on 8 November 2007, the United Nations General Assembly decided in resolution 62/7 that the International Day of Democracy would be observed annually on the fixed date of 15 September, and that all Member States, organizations, non-governmental organizations and individuals are invited to commemorate the International Day of Democracy in an appropriate manner that contributes to raising public awareness;
 - (2) notes further that the United Nations General Assembly invited Member States to make sure that parliamentarians and civil society organizations are given appropriate opportunities to be involved in, and contribute to, the celebration of the International Day of Democracy;
 - (3) notes also that the United Nations General Assembly reaffirmed that “democracy is a universal value based on the freely expressed will of people to determine their own political, economic, social and cultural systems, and their full participation in all aspects of life;” and that “While democracies share common features, there is no single model of democracy and that democracy does not belong to any country or region.”;
 - (4) notes that the Inter-Parliamentary Union adopted a Universal Declaration on Democracy on 16 September 1997 in which it recalled the principles of democracy, the elements and exercise of democratic government and the international dimension of democracy;
 - (5) notes further the Inter-Parliamentary Union’s strong support for the International Day of Democracy held on 15 September as declared by the United Nations;
 - (6) notes that the Inter-Parliamentary Union has urged parliaments to celebrate the International Day of Democracy as an opportunity for parliaments to:
 - (a) emphasize the importance of democracy, what it involves, the challenges it faces as well as the opportunities it offers, and the central responsibility that all parliaments have as the key institution of democracy; and
 - (b) examine and discuss how well parliament performs its democratic functions and identify what steps it may take to strengthen its effectiveness; and
 - (7) declares its strong support for the International Day of Democracy (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 6 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)

- 25 **POVERTY:** Resumption of debate (*from 13 October 2008*) on the motion of Ms Owens—That the House:
- (1) notes:
 - (a) that 12-18 October marks Anti-Poverty Week with the United Nations declaring Friday 17 October as International Anti-Poverty Day; and
 - (b) that the last time Australia contributed .5 per cent of Gross National Income (GNI) was in 1974-75 and that the contribution has declined since then to as low as .25 per cent from 2000-04;
 - (2) recognises:
 - (a) the Federal Government's commitment to lifting the nation's contribution to .5 per cent of GNI by 2015; and
 - (b) that the majority of the world's poor live in our region;
 - (3) commends the excellent work done by Micah Challenge and Make Poverty History in bringing this matter to public prominence; and
 - (4) calls on the Government to continue to play a leadership role in our region and to honour our commitment to the Millennium Development Goals. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 7 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)
- 26 **TOURISM INDUSTRY:** Resumption of debate (*from 13 October 2008— Mr Turnour, in continuation*) on the motion of Mr Ciobo—That the House:
- (1) condemns the Government for abandoning the tourism industry in a time of need;
 - (2) notes the negative impact that the Government's decision to reduce funding for Tourism Australia by \$5.9 million in real terms will have on the tourism industry;
 - (3) recognises that the Government's \$940 million of new tourism taxes will adversely affect the 483,000 Australians employed in the tourism industry; and
 - (4) acknowledges that, in the new spirit of cooperative federalism, many State Labor Governments are following the example set by the Federal Government and are reducing their support for the tourism industry. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 7 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)
- 27 **KOKODA TRACK CAMPAIGN:** Resumption of debate (*from 13 October 2008*) on the motion of Mrs Moylan—That the House:
- (1) recognises the importance of the Kokoda Track campaign in World War II in stopping the overland Japanese advance to Port Moresby, which would have given the enemy a beachhead into Australia;
 - (2) acknowledges the courage, endurance, mateship and sacrifice demonstrated by the Australian Defence personnel during the Kokoda battles;
 - (3) pays tribute to the contribution of Papua New Guinea (PNG) nationals, specifically the Koiari people affectionately known as "Fuzzy Wuzzy Angels" in carrying supplies and equipment for Australian soldiers in the Kokoda campaign as well as the carriage of wounded to safety;
 - (4) notes that the Kokoda battles were fought in PNG from July 1942 on Australian soil; and
 - (5) in recognition of this contribution, urges the Australian Government to:
 - (a) acknowledge the service of the PNG nationals affectionately known as "Fuzzy Wuzzy Angels";
 - (b) direct the new Defence Awards and Honours Tribunal to promptly determine the most appropriate form of medal or recognition for the remaining "Fuzzy Wuzzy Angels" or their surviving families;
 - (c) consider any other appropriate initiatives including making a small ex-gratia payment to each "Fuzzy Wuzzy Angel", in recognition of their contribution over and above the call of duty; and
 - (d) examine, and where appropriate fund initiatives to upgrade the health and education status of the PNG people in the isolated villages along the Kokoda Track. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 7 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)
- 28 **GROCERYCHOICE WEBSITE:** Resumption of debate (*from 20 October 2008*) on the motion of Mr Hartsuyker—That the House notes with concern, the failure of the GROCERYchoice website to provide meaningful information to consumers, in particular the:
- (1) failure of GROCERYchoice to provide meaningful information in a timely fashion;

- (2) failure of GROCERYchoice to enable a comparison of price and quality; and
 - (3) inherent bias of GROCERYchoice against independent retailers. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 8 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)

- 30 **CHOCOLATE INDUSTRY AND CHILD EXPLOITATION:** Resumption of debate (*from 20 October 2008*) on the motion of Mr Pyne—That the House:
- (1) notes:
 - (a) today there are hundreds of thousands of children working on cocoa farms in Ivory Coast and Ghana and that these children routinely carry heavy loads, and work with fire, chemicals and knives, with little or no protection. Many of them have no chance of going to school;
 - (b) about 70 per cent of the cocoa beans used to make chocolate around the world come from West Africa, namely Ivory Coast and Ghana; and
 - (c) the principal reason that child labour is employed to grow cocoa is because cocoa farmers are paid so poorly for their produce;
 - (2) commends World Vision Australia for its ‘Don’t Trade Lives’ campaign to draw attention to the plight of child exploitation in the world today; and
 - (3) calls on the Prime Minister to take action to ensure that the chocolate industry knows Australia is serious about ending child exploitation and slavery by introducing a policy requiring vending machines in Australian Government offices to stock Fair Trade Chocolate exclusively. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 8 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)
- 31 **DAW AUNG SAN SUU KYI:** Resumption of debate (*from 20 October 2008*) on the motion of Ms Saffin—That the House:
- (1) notes that:
 - (a) the 19 June 2008 marks the 63rd birthday of Nobel laureate and leader of the democracy movement in Burma, Daw Aung San Suu Kyi;
 - (b) Daw Aung San Suu Kyi has been held under house arrest since May 2003, and periodically before then since 1989;
 - (c) the Burmese military dictatorship has refused to acknowledge the results of the 1990 election, in which the National League for Democracy of which Daw Aung San Suu Kyi was General Secretary, won an overwhelming majority; and
 - (d) Daw Aung San Suu Kyi has refused a number of opportunities to leave Burma, even to visit her dying husband, knowing that she would be denied the right to return to continue the struggle for democracy and human rights in Burma;
 - (2) welcomes the Australian Government’s continued advocacy on behalf of democracy in Burma;
 - (3) calls on the Government to continue to pressure the Burmese regime to immediately and unconditionally release Daw Aung San Suu Kyi and all political prisoners in Burma including a number of Members of Parliament and to commence an inclusive national reconciliation process to restore genuine democracy in Burma; and
 - (4) that the House congratulates Daw Aung San Suu Kyi on her birthday and for her efforts to campaign for human rights and democracy on behalf of the people of Burma. (*Order of the day will be removed from the Notice Paper unless re-accorded priority on any of the next 8 sitting Mondays after 10 November 2008.*)
