WEDNESDAY, 25TH SEPTEMBER, 1901.

- 1. The House met pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Return to Writ.—Mr. Speaker announced that he had received a return to the Writ he had issued for the election of a Member to serve for the Electoral Division of Darling Downs, in the State of Queensland, in the place of the Honorable W. H. Groom, deceased, by which it appeared that Littleton Ernest Groom had been duly elected in pursuance of the said Writ.
- 3. Member Sworn.—Littleton Ernest Groom, Esquire, was then introduced, and made and subscribed the oath required by law.
