- 1. The House met pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Message from the Senate.—Electoral Bill.—Mr. Speaker announced the receipt of the following Message from the Senate:—

MR. SPEAKER,

Message No. 57.

The Senate returns to the House of Representatives the Bill for "An Act to regulate Parliamentary Elections," and acquaints the House of Representatives that the Senate does not insist upon that part of its amendment to amendment No. 104 of the House of Representatives to which that House disagrees, and agrees to the consequential amendments in clause 140A, does not insist upon its disagreement to amendments Nos. 6, 58, 139, 141, and 196, and agrees to the consequential amendments of the House of Representatives in amendments Nos. 110 and 161.

The Senate insists upon its disagreement to amendments Nos. 21, 22, 23, 24, 114, 180, and 192 as set out in the annexed Schedule, and requests the reconsideration of the Bill in regard to these amendments.
