- 1. The House met pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Printing Committee—Fifth Report from.—Sir John Quick, Chairman, brought up the Fifth Report from the Printing Committee.

The Report was read by the Clerk, and is as follows:-

REPORT

The Printing Committee have the honour to report that they have dealt with all the Papers laid on the Table of the House since the last sitting of the Committee, and beg to recommend that the following Papers be printed:—

Presented Paper.—War Office and Admiralty Supplies—Correspondence with reference to. Presented Paper.—Electoral Act 1902—Report of the Commissioner (Mr. G. C. Morrison) appointed to distribute the State of Victoria into Divisions.

In connexion with this Paper the Committee recommend that the technical description of the boundaries be not printed.

Presented Paper.—Transcontinental Railway from Kalgoorlie to Port Augusta—Correspondence regarding the strategical importance of the proposed railway.

With reference to the Presented Paper—"Evidence given before the Royal Commission on Federal Capital Sites for the Seat of Government of the Commonwealth," the Committee find that the cost of printing would amount to £250, and as the evidence (which is chiefly that of private residents interested in the localities affected) is fully epitomized in the report of the Commission, the Committee do not feel justified in recommending that the Paper be printed.
