- 1. The House met, at eleven o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.-Mr. Speaker (the Honorable Sir Littleton Groom) took the Chair, and read Prayers.

5. Message from the Governor-General.—Financial Agreement Bill.—The following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General was presented, and the same was read by Mr. Speaker:

STONEHAVEN,

Governor-General.

Message No. 84.

In accordance with the requirements of section 56 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue and moneys be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to approve an agreement between the Commonwealth of Australia of the First Part and the States of New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, South Australia, Western Australia, and Tasmania of the Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth and Seventh Parts respectively and for other purposes.

Canberra, 13th December, 1927.

Ordered-That the foregoing Message be taken into consideration, in Committee of the whole House

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

#### 14th December, 1927.

#### (In the Committee.)

Mr. Bruce (Prime Minister) moved, That it is expedient that an appropriation of revenue and moneys be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to approve an agreement between the Commonwealth of Australia of the First Part and the States of New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, South Australia, Western Australia, and Tasmania of the Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, and Seventh Parts respectively and for other purposes.

Question—put and passed. Resolution to be reported.

The House resumed; Mr. Bayley reported accordingly.
Mr. Bruce moved, pursuant to contingent notice, That the Standing Orders be suspended, toenable the remaining stages to be passed without delay.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.

The Resolution reported from the Committee was read, and, on the motion of Mr. Bruce, was,

after debate, adopted by the House. Ordered—That Mr. Bruce and Mr. Earle Page do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing Resolution.

Mr. Bruce then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time. Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Mr. Bruce moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Mr. Charlton moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.

Ordered—That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.

6. Paper.—Mr. Speaker presented, pursuant to Statute—

Mr. Pratten (Minister for Trade and Customs) moved, That the Item be amended by omitting from sub-item (AA) "1st July", and inserting "15th January".

Debate ensued.

Mr. Charlton moved, as an amendment upon the amendment, That "15th January" be omitted from the proposed amendment, and "15th December" inserted.

Chairman's Ruling.—The Chairman (Mr Bayley) stated that the amendment upon the proposed amendment would involve the imposition of aduty on a date sooner than required by the Government, and would therefore produce an additional sum from customs duties. He also informed the Committee that the precedents of the House of Commons and of this House have clearly determined that no motion or amendment can be made to impose or increase a tax or duty, except by a Minister of the Crown, and that it is not competent for a private Member to propose an increase on any rate or duty in excess of such rate or duty proposed in the Resolutions of the Government. He therefore ruled the amendment upon the proposed amendment out of order.

Dissent from Chairman's Ruling.—Mr. Scullin having handed in, in writing, an objection to the Ruling of the Chairman, moved, That the Ruling be dissented from.
