## THURSDAY, 23RD FEBRUARY, 1928.

- 1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable Sir Littleton Groom) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL.—ASSENT TO BILLS.—The following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General was received, and the same was read by Mr. Speaker :--

- 3. SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS--PRECEDENCE OF WANT OF CONFIDENCE MOTION.--Mr. Bruce (Prime Minister) moved, by leave, That so much of the Standing and Sessional Orders be suspended as will enable the Notice of Motion No. 1 (Want of Confidence in the Government) to take precedence of all other Business until disposed of. Question--put and passed.
- 4. WANT OF CONFIDENCE IN THE GOVERNMENT.—Mr. Charlton (Leader of the Opposition) moved, pursuant to notice, That, in the opinion of this House, the Government is deserving of severe censure for its failure to adequately protect Australian industries and to limit migration to the nation's ability to absorb new arrivals, together with its neglect to formulate proposals to deal with unemployment.

Debate ensued.

Mr. Lazzarini, addressing the House, and not having concluded his speech, the House ordered that the honorable Member have leave to continue his speech when the debate is resumed.

Ordered—That the debate be now adjourned, and that the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for the next sitting.
