SOMERS,

Administering the Government of the Commonwealth of Australia.

Message No. 54.

A Proposed Law intituled :----" *Immigration Act* 1930," as finally passed by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth, having been presented to the Person Administering the Government of the Commonwealth of Australia for the Royal Assent, His Excellency has, in the name and on behalf of His Majesty, assented to the said Law.
