- 1. The House met, at three o'clock p.m., according to the terms of the Resolution of the 14th December last.—Mr. Speaker (the Honorable G. J. Bell) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. MINISTERIAL STATEMENT.—DISTRIBUTION OF MINISTERIAL DUTIES AND CHANGE IN MINISTRY.—Mr. Earle Page (Acting Prime Minister), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement informing the House that during the absence from Australia of the Prime Minister and Treasurer (Mr. Lyons), he (Mr. Earle Page) would be Acting Prime Minister, and the Assistant Treasurer (Mr. Casey) would be Acting Treasurer. Mr. Earle Page also announced that during the absence of the Attorney-General (Mr. Menzies) Senator Brennan would be Acting Attorney-General, and would be represented in the House by the Vice-President of the Executive Council (Mr. Hughes).

The House was also informed that in the absence of the Minister directing negotiations for Trade Treaties (Sir Henry Gullett) his duties would be carried out by the Minister for Trade and Customs (Mr. White), and that in the absence of the Minister in charge of War Service Homes (Mr. Thorby) his duties would be carried out by the Minister without portfolio (Mr. Hunter)
