Adjournment-Motion for Purpose of Discussion .-- Mr. Makin rose in his place, and said that he proposed to move the adjournment of the House for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance, namely, "The proposal to recruit fifty youths to undertake mining operations at the Granites in the Northern Territory at rates of wages and under conditions that constitute a serious evasion of the industrial standards applying within the Territory.'

Mr. Speaker thereupon called upon those Members who approved of the proposed discussion to rise in their places, and more than the necessary number of Members having risen accordingly-

Mr. Makin moved, That the House do now adjourn.

- 5. Loan Appropriation (Unemployment Relief) Bill (1935).—Mr. Casey (Acting Treasurer) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to amend the Loan Appropriation (Unemployment Relief) Act 1934.
